Big Walnut senior died Friday of injuries she received in an automobile accident last Thursday afternoon.

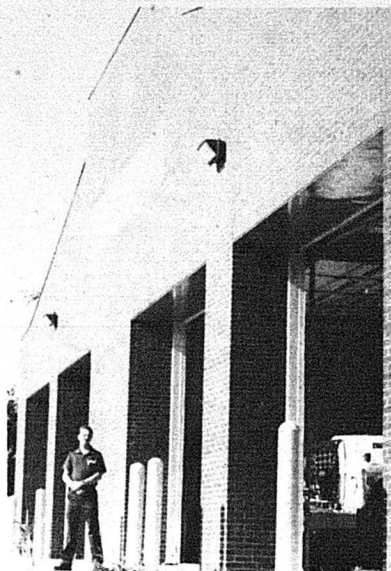
Amy Elizabeth Dickson, 17, daughter of Diane and Larry Mazzola, Sunbury, and Benjamin Lee Dickson, Virginia Beach, Va., died at Grand Medical Center Friday where she was taken following the accident.

Amy was a member of the Big Walnut Band and girls soccer team. She was on the editorial staff for the high school paper, Eagles on Review. She was a member of the Christ the King Christian Church in Columbus.

Besides her mother and stepfather, here, Amy is survived by two brothers, Joseph and Michael Mazzola; by her maternal grandparents, John and Betty Walker, Gloucester, and paternal grandparents, George and Anna Dickson, Richmond, Va.; step-grandparents, Lawrence and Connie Mazzola, of Columbus; numerous aunts, uncles and cousins.

'Official' Count Shows 48% Vote On BW Tax Issue

'Official' count from the May 4 election shows 48.1 percent of the registered voters in the Big Walnut School District voted "yes" on the 12.5-mill real estate tax went down.

Delaware county Board of Elections reports 3,947 of the school district's 8,206 registered voters cast their ballots on the levy issue. The 'official' count, certified by the elections board Tuesday, shows the Big Walnut levy failing 2,471-1,476.

Throughout Delaware county, turn-outs were relatively high for an off-year, special election, comments director Janet Brennenman at the elections office, especially for school issues. Overall voter turn-out was 15,727, or 35.35 percent of the 44,579 registered voters.

Other 'official' tallies from May 4 show the county-wide Children's Services levy going down, 8,064-7,215 while the Delaware JVS renewal levy passed, 7,159-6,911.

Delaware county voters for the Buckeye Valley \$14.1-million bond issue show it defeated 1,833,139, and Glenfong's 7.9 mill operating levy passed, 3,023-2,120.

Dan, Leslie Duren Restore Victorian-Era Home Here

Dan and Leslie Duren could teach Bob Vila, the home repair handyman seen on television, a thing or two about turning a home into a showplace.

The couple are in the last stage of five, restoring their Victorian home on Otis Street in Sunbury to represent a Victorian-age home, with their personal touches.

"Leslie saw it completely done (in 1987), all I saw was a lot of work to be done," Dan says.

Now that dreams is almost a reality, Leslie says all they have to do is lay a brick path, restore the basin and replace the tips of the scroll work near the roof.

These final tasks come after six years of restoration, including tearing out walls, stripping and refinishing floors and antique furniture, painting, removing wallpaper, landscaping and making cosmetic improvements on both the inside and outside.

"We undid things that had been done. We put things back the way

they were at that time," Leslie says. While the Durens are restoring their house, with help from their parents and others, they search the country for antiques.

No 511 of the 1,000 made that year, according to Dan.

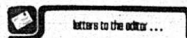

DCB Presents Plaque to T-Hydraulics

The Delaware County Bank vice president, along with Delaware county officials and the Big Walnut Area Chamber of Commerce director are shown above presenting a plaque last Friday to Vance Studien, president of T-Hydraulics Inc., in front of the facility in the Sunbury Industrial Park.

Those presenting the plaque are, from left, Neil Welf, Big Walnut Area Chamber of Commerce director; Doug Garver, director of economic development for Delaware county; Merin "Boots" Sheets, Delaware county commissioner; Vance Studien, accepting the plaque; William Dudley, The Delaware County Bank vice president of commercial loans; David Herson, vice president, loan division manager for The Bank; and Brian Stanfill, county administrator.

The plaque was presented to T-Hydraulics, formerly of Westerville, by The Bank, which arranged the financing, through the Community Improvement program. Other companies listed on the plaque are Digital Storage Inc. and Campus Commodities Inc., which also moved to Delaware county.

"We were just really pleased to arrange that type of funding for a small business in the county. It will create jobs and expand the tax base," Dudley says.

The Delaware County Bank loaned T-Hydraulics \$1,400,000 for building the 20,000 square foot building, purchasing equipment and providing a line of credit, Dudley says.

The 20,000 square foot building, including four acres, equipment and inventory, cost approximately \$3,700,000.

"It's really our business to work with small companies," Dudley says.

"We have developed expertise in getting resources for smaller businesses," he continues.

Dudley says small businesses moving to Delaware county have increased over the last few years due to places such as the Sunbury Industrial Park.

T-Hydraulics, the manufacturer of pressure and load transducers, many for the Navy and Air Force last year moved to the Sunbury Industrial Park.

Delaware county is giving the company tax exemption equal to 65 percent on all equipment, furniture and fixtures and machinery acquired as part of the project, and 70 percent for the first five years and 50 percent after that on its annual inventory.

The county and the Big Walnut School District are giving a 70 percent, \$100,000 tax exemption on real estate taxes over a 10-year period.

T-Hydraulics will continue to pay real estate taxes on the four acres as an unimproved plot.

The company plans to expand its 20,000 square foot facility to 50,000 square feet eventually, says Studien, now a Sunbury resident.

He also would like to expand his 80 employees to approximately 80.

"TOOTH TRUTHS"

Sticky candy has long been stuck on the cavity culprit list, blamed for clinging to teeth and allowing bacteria to flourish and cause tooth decay. But a new study suggests that this theory may be as realistic as the tooth fairy.

Researchers at the Forsyth Dental Center in Boston tested 21 different snack foods to see how long they remained on the teeth. Surprisingly, starchy foods, cookies, crackers, and potato chips were found to be more likely to stick to the tooth's surface than were the "sticky" high-sugar snacks like jelly beans, caramels and hot fudge sundaes, which dissolved faster.

Does this mean you can eat gumdrops and other sticky foods all day long without a worry? No, it simply means that the foods you have always perceived to be sticky may not be the ones that actually adhere to your teeth. So regardless of your choice of snack, you should be sure to brush and floss regularly.

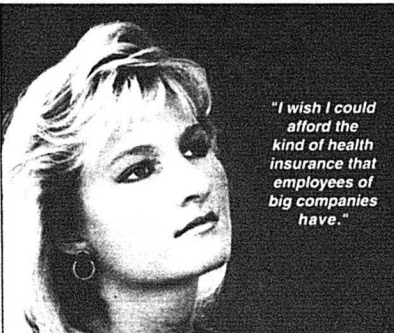

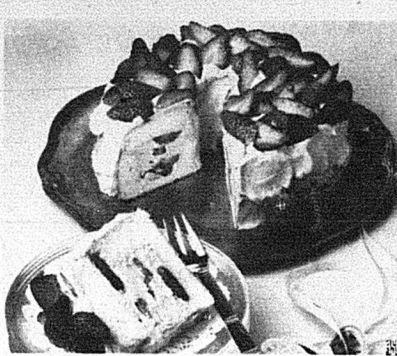

Slice off entire top of cake about 1 inch down, set aside. To form tunnel, cut around inside of cake 1 inch from outer edge and 1 inch from inner edge, leaving a base of cake 1 inch thick on the bottom. Gently pull out cake within cuts (reserve for another use). Place hollowed cake on serving plate. In large bowl combine cream, sugar and cocoa; whip until soft peaks form. 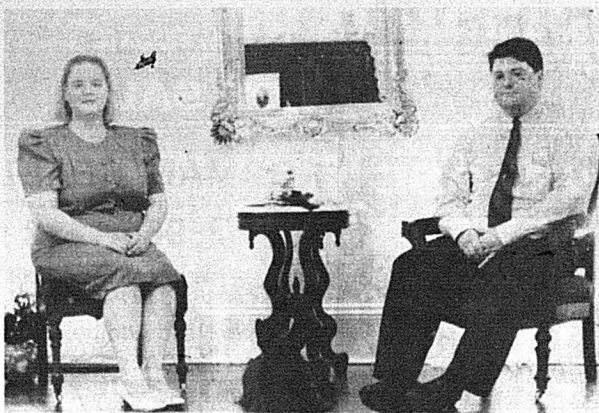
Today, the club will visit "Behalt," the Carleise House and Cheese Factory in Amish country.

Durens Feel Victorian Parlor Is Favorite Room

"The chairs in our parlor are like any that would've been in a middle-class home in the 1800s," Leslie says.

The small table, which was a gift to Leslie, is a reproduction of an antique.

This room also contains an 1840s sofa, a 1901 Stuyvesant piano, No. 311 of 1,000 made that year, and a handcrafted stained glass window, which was made in 1889 by an Amish woman for Leslie's birthday.

The piano still plays, but one of the keys sticks. It will cost \$6,000 to get the inside of the piano restored," Leslie says.

Other rooms in the Duren home that contain antiques are the "South Dakota" room (Leslie's father, Dale, grew up there), the library, the main bedroom, a sitting room and the elegant dining room.

To get the rooms in their present condition, the Durens, with help from family and others, stripped and refinished antique furniture, painted, removed wallpaper and put up wall covering, tore out walls and replastered all of the ceilings.

"Plaster dust continues to settle for six months. Anyone who has restored a house knows that," Leslie laughs.

"We've made the house more livable by tearing out walls and leaving more space," Dan says.

Leslie says where they need more space is in their closet. Their house has only one closet, and the couple made that themselves.

Dan explains that Victorian-age houses did not have closets because each closet was considered a room and the residents were charge extra taxes on each room.

The Durens next year will try their hand at starting completely from scratch with a house they will begin building in Coshocton.

him."

Although restoring a house is a lot of work, the Durens have only their parents and a few others helping them turn their house into a true Victorian home.

"It is definitely a family affair," Dan says.

Leslie says her mother, Ruth Parker, was the driving force behind both supervising the work done and getting it done, taking a year off between jobs in order to help the Durens get their house finished.

"I give my mother a lot of the credit for getting the house done," Leslie says. "She'd get up at 4 a.m. sometimes and not go to bed until 1 a.m."

"She did everything from floor to ceiling. She was amazing, she painted the walls, removed the wallpaper and refinished the furniture and floors."

Her mother, a branch manager for a stockbroker in Roscoe Village, near Coshocton, did all of those tasks without previous experience.

Now with this restoration experience under her belt, Ruth helps to restore her friends' homes.

Leslie's father, Dale, painted the outside of the house and barn a cream color. The house was painted with Lancaster Whitewash. The two buildings used to be blue.

Dan's father, Dan, whose landscaping company landscaped historic Roscoe Village near Coshocton, landscaped their yard.

Both Leslie and Dan grew up near Roscoe Village, which has many restored historical homes.

Besides having their parents help, the Durens hired carpenters Bill and Eileen Bess, who rent a house in Coshocton from Leslie's parents.

In fact, the Besses lived in an Airstream trailer for two years from May through October in the Durens' driveway while working on the house.

Other helpers included handyman Ellis "Sarge" Sargeant and upholsterer Mrs. Jacob Miller.

Leslie says they have spent approximately \$40,000 total on the restoration and antiques, after paying \$66,000 for the house in 1987.

"Really that isn't much money considering a house in German Village costs more than \$100,000, and it isn't even restored," Leslie says.

In the six years of restoration, only five tasks have had to be repeated due to mistakes.

"I think that's really good for the first time around," Leslie says.

"Mistakes happen. We'll know not to do that next time."

Although there have been few mistakes, Leslie says she can remember many mishaps.

Just a few weeks ago, Leslie heard Dan's sister, Carol Ann, who lives with them, yelling that water was coming through the library ceiling after Leslie had filled the bathtub.

"I ran downstairs, and water was everywhere," Leslie says.

She explains that a piece of pipe rusted through, causing the water to have to "jump" from one pipe to another. The portion of pipe into which it was "jumping" eventually turned down, which caused the water to flood the library.

The water damaged a small portion of the library ceiling and floor.

Another part of the library ceiling also was damaged around this same time when water leaking from the washer caused part of the ceiling plaster to fall.

Recently, the Durens were carrying a sofa up the steps when one of the steps suddenly caved in.

"We dropped the sofa right there," Leslie laughs.

Although this is the first house that the Durens have restored, Leslie has been interested in Victorian-era houses since she was a teen-ager.

"I received my first copy of Victorian Home Magazine when I was 19 and I was hooked," Leslie says.

"I love that period. If I could go back in a time machine, I would go back to the Victorian age," she adds.

"I wasn't really interested in restoring houses until Leslie became interested," Dan says.

They have enjoyed restoring their Sunbury home so much that the couple have decided to start from scratch and build a second home in Coshocton beginning next year, though they plan to keep their Sunbury home.

"They'll have to carry me out of this house in a box," Dan says.

Leslie says, "I think it's harder to build a new home than restoring an older home because you have to start from scratch."

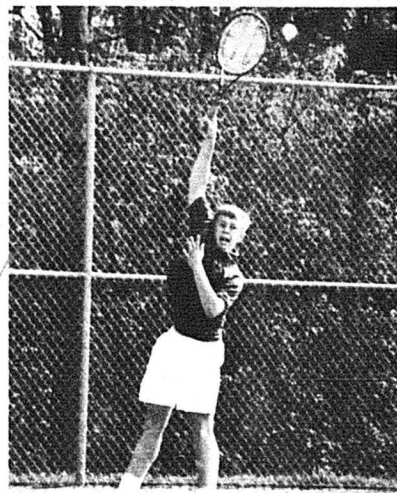

Yeagle was also a member of the Eagles cross country team. That group won the championship in 1991 and took runner up honors last fall.

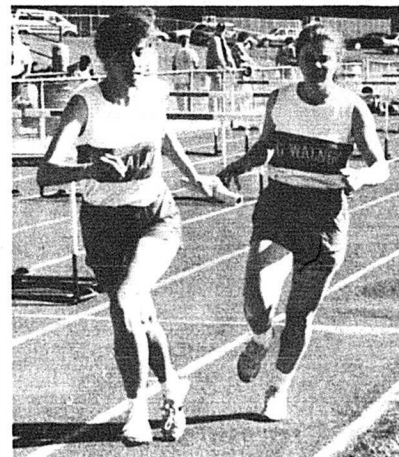

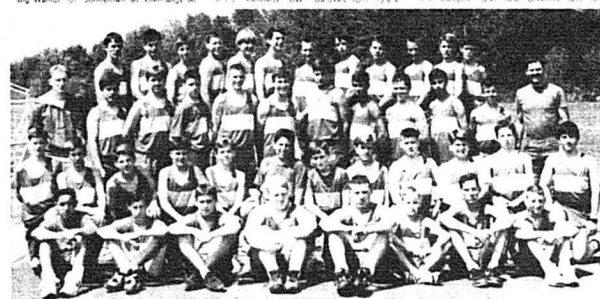

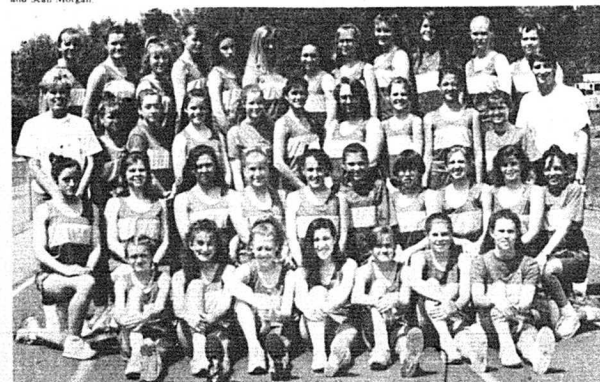

In April, Troop 950 helped with the leaders appreciation dinner at the Harlem Grange Hall. This was a service project of the troop.

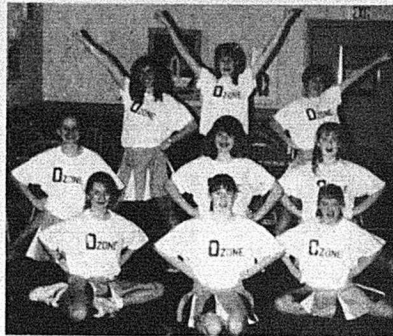

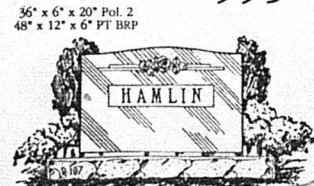

OSU Grad Course To Focus on Harrison Lab



Harrison Street Lab, Teachers Featured in Course

Three Harrison Street Elementary teachers and the building's computer lab will be featured in an Ohio State University graduate course for education this spring.

The three teachers are pictured above with, left, Mike Carder,

assistant superintendent of BW Schools, who oversaw the set-up of the lab. Tom Speece, Pamela Bird and Mary Ellen Stamm listen to Carder as he explains the school's new computer overhead projector.

The OSU course is to be aired over WOSU-TV and is entitled "Technology in the Curriculum: A Distance Telecourse for K-12 Educators." Harrison Street's computer lab is the focus of the local segment to be videotaped.

Graduate education representatives from The Ohio State University will be using the computer lab at Harrison Street Elementary School this spring as part of a telecourse concerning technology in curriculum.

Principal Wes Newland reports the OSU College of Education in conjunction with WOSU-TV will telecast a 2-credit graduate course entitled "Technology in the Curriculum: A Distance Telecourse for K-12 Educators." The course will be open to all educators having a Bachelor's Degree within the WOSU-TV viewing area.

Harrison Street's computer lab will be featured as one of several public education institutions in Ohio that has distinguished itself through the advancement of technological development and instruction in the classroom, Newland says.

Big Walnut assistant superintendent Mike Carder oversaw the set up of Harrison's computer lab, and he and first grade teacher Pamela Bird coordinated staff in-service and the introduction of supplemental learning devices to the students. Bird is the building coordinator at Harrison Street.

Carder and Bird conducted a training session last August for the teachers on the building's 13 Macintosh computers, and have since met monthly in pursuing software and hard drive applications. Newland says Harrison Street's computers were bought with money from the school district's recent bond issue, while the school purchased about \$7,000 worth of software from the principal's account, with money earned through candy sales and other fund raising events. Harrison Street students then have

the opportunity to interact with the computers a minimum of one class each week, Newland explains. The lab is also available for additional class research at both teacher and course discretion.

Carder says the purpose of the computer lab is "to give the children of our community schools a chance to be exposed to this important resource." Carder continues, "Our goal is to equip Big Walnut students with an overall knowledge of how to employ computers and accompanying software programs as helpmates that can prove to be advantageous to them throughout their personal and professional being."

Harrison Street parents also were able to "get into the act" last fall through a volunteer computer conference. Those parents have then been used throughout the year as teacher aides in the computer laboratory.

Three Harrison Street classroom teachers and their groups will be highlighted in the video clip. Newland says, including Bird, Mary Ellen Stamm and Tom Speece. The film is to show the elementary teachers in their daily computer usage and may even entail some teacher interviews about their use of the lab.

PUBLIC NOTICE

ORDINANCE NO. 93-011

An Ordinance providing for the issuance and sale of \$200,000 Notes, in anticipation of the issuance of Bonds, for the purpose of improving the Sewerage System of the Village by Constructing and Installing Storm Sewers, Catch Basins, Manholes, Connections and Necessary Appurtenances, and Declaring an Emergency.

Whereas, pursuant to Ordinance No. 92-18 passed April 15, 1992, notes in anticipation of bonds in the amount of \$225,000, dated May 7, 1992 (the Outstanding Notes), were issued for the purpose stated in Section 1, to mature on May 6, 1993;

Whereas, this Council finds and determines that the Village should retire the Outstanding Notes with the proceeds of the Notes described in Section 2 and other funds available to the Village; and

Whereas, the Clerk-Treasurer as fiscal officer of this Village has certified to this Council that the aggregate principal amount of \$200,000 (the Bonds) for the purpose of improving the sewerage system of the Village by constructing and installing storm sewers, catch basins, manholes, connections and necessary appurtenances;

Section 2. The Bonds shall be dated approximately May 1, 1994, shall bear interest at the now estimated rate of 6 1/8% per year, payable semi-annually until the principal amount is paid, and are estimated to mature in 20 annual principal installments that are substantially equal.

Section 3. It is necessary to issue and this Council determines that notes in the aggregate principal amount of \$200,000 (the Notes) shall be issued in anticipation of the issuance of the Bonds and to retire, together with other funds available to the Village, the Outstanding Notes. The Notes shall bear interest at a rate or rates not to exceed 7 1/4% per year, computed on a 360-day per year basis, payable at maturity and until the principal amount is paid or payment is provided for if required by the original purchaser. The Notes may provide that, in the event the Village does not pay or make provision for payment at maturity of the debt charges on the Notes, the principal amount of the Notes shall bear interest at a different rate or rates not to exceed 9 1/4% per year from the maturity date until the Village pays or makes provision to pay that principal amount. The rate or rates of interest on the notes shall be determined by the Clerk-Treasurer in the certificate awarding the Notes in accordance with Section 6 of this ordinance.

Section 4. The debt charges on the Notes shall be payable in lawful money of the United States of America, or in Federal Reserve

funds of the United States of America if so requested by the original purchaser, and shall be payable, without deduction for services of the Village, to the Village, at the main office of National City Bank, Columbus, Ohio, or at the principal office of a bank or trust company requested by the original purchaser of the Notes, provided that such request shall be approved by the Clerk-Treasurer and determined that the payment at that bank or trust company will not endanger the funds or securities of the Village and that proper procedures and safeguards are available for that purpose. The Notes shall be dated May 6, 1993 and shall mature on May 5, 1994.

Section 5. The Notes shall be signed by the Mayor and Clerk-Treasurer, in the name of the Village and in their official capacities, provided that one of those signatures may be a facsimile. The Notes shall be issued in the denominations and numbers as requested by the original purchaser and approved by the Clerk-Treasurer, provided that the entire principal amount may be represented by a single note. The Notes shall not have coupons attached, shall be numbered as determined by the Clerk-Treasurer and shall express upon their faces the purpose, in summary terms, for which they are issued and that they are issued pursuant to this ordinance.

Section 6. The Notes shall be sold at not less than par at private sale by the Clerk-Treasurer in accordance with law and the provisions of this ordinance. The Clerk-Treasurer shall sign the certificate of award referred to in Section 1 evidencing the sale, cause the Notes to be prepared, and have the Notes signed and delivered, together with a transcript of proceedings with reference to the issuance of the Notes if requested by the original purchaser, to the original purchaser upon payment of the purchase price.

Section 7. The proceeds from the sale of the Notes, except any premium or accrued interest, shall be paid into the proper fund or funds and those proceeds are appropriated and shall be used for the purpose for which the Notes are being issued. Any portion of those proceeds representing premium and accrued interest shall be paid into the Bond Retirement Fund.

Section 8. The par value to be received from the sale of the Bonds or of any renewal notes and any excess funds resulting from the issuance of the Notes shall, to the extent necessary, be used to pay the debt charges on the Notes at maturity and are pledged for that purpose.

Section 9. During the year or years in which the Notes are outstanding, there shall be levied on all the taxable property in the Village, in addition to all other taxes, the same tax that would have been levied if the Bonds had been issued without the prior issuance of the Notes. The tax shall be within the ten-mill limitation imposed by law, shall be and is ordered computed, certified, levied and extended upon the tax duplicate and collected by the same officers, in the same manner, and at the same time that taxes for general purposes for each of those years are certified, levied, extended and collected, and shall be placed before and in preference to all other items and for the full amount thereof. The proceeds of the tax levy shall be placed in the Bond Retirement Fund, which is irrevocably pledged for the payment of the debt charges on the Notes or the Bonds when and as the same fall due.

Section 10. The Village covenants that it will use, and will restrict the use and investment of, the proceeds of the Notes in such manner and to such extent as may be necessary so that (a) the Notes will not (i) constitute private activity bonds, arbitrage bonds or hedge bonds under Section 141, 144 or 149 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the Code) or (ii) be treated other than as bonds to which Section 103(a) of the Code applies; and (b) the in-

terest on the Notes will not be treated as an item of tax preference under Section 57 of the Code.

The Village further covenants that (a) it will take or cause to be taken such actions that may be required of it for the interest on the Notes to be and remain excluded from gross income for federal income tax purposes; (b) it will not take or authorize to be taken any actions that would adversely affect that exclusion; (c) it, or persons acting for it, will, among other acts of compliance, (i) apply the proceeds of the Notes to the governmental purpose of the borrowing; (ii) restrict the yield on investment property; (iii) make timely and adequate payments to the federal government; (iv) maintain books and records and make calculations and reports and (v) refrain from certain uses of those proceeds; and, as applicable, of property financed with such proceeds, all in such manner and to the extent necessary to assure such exclusion of that interest under the Code.

The Village hereby represents that the Outstanding Notes are treated as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" pursuant to Section 265(b)(3) of the Code. The Village hereby covenants that it will redeem the Outstanding Notes from proceeds of, and within 90 days after issuance of, the Notes, and represents that all other conditions are met for treating the Notes as "qualified tax-exempt obligations" and as not to be taken into account under subparagraph (D) of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code, without necessity for further action by the Village under paragraph (D)(ii) of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code. Further, the Village represents and covenants

that, during any time or in any manner as might affect the status of the Notes as "qualified tax-exempt obligations," it has not, and will not, participate in the formation of, or be benefited from or availed itself of, any entity in order to avoid the purposes of subparagraph (C) or (D) of Section 265(b)(3) of the Code, and will not form, participate in the formation of, or benefit from or avail itself of, any such entity. The Village further represents that the Notes are not being issued as part of a direct or indirect nonexempt issue that combines issues or lots of tax-exempt obligations of different issuers.

Each covenant made in this section with respect to the Notes is also made with respect to all issues any portion of the debt service on which is paid from proceeds of the Notes (and, if different, the original issue, and any refunding issues in a series of refundings), to the extent such compliance is necessary to assure exclusion of interest on the Notes from gross income for federal income tax purposes, and the officers and directors are authorized to take actions with respect to those issues as they are authorized in this section to take with respect to the Notes.

The Clerk-Treasurer, as the fiscal officer, or any other officer of the Village having responsibility for the issuance of the Notes is hereby authorized (a) to make or effect any election, selection, designation, choice, consent, approval, or waiver on behalf of the Village with respect to the Notes as the Village is permitted to be required to make or give under the federal income tax laws, including, without limitation thereto, any of the elections provided for in

Section 140(f)(4)(C) of the Code or available under Section 148 of the Code, for the purpose of assuring, enhancing, or protecting favorable tax treatment or status of the Notes or interest thereon or assuring compliance with requirements for that purpose, reducing the burden or expense of such compliance, reducing the rebate amount or payments or penalties, or making payments of special amounts in lieu of making computations to determine, or paying excess earnings as rebate, or violating the amount or payments, as determined by that officer, which action shall be in writing and signed by the officer; (b) to take any and all other actions, make or obtain calculations, make payments, and make or give reports, covenants and certifications of and on behalf of the Village, as may be appropriate to assure the exclusion of interest from gross income and the intended tax status of the Notes; and (c) to give one or more appropriate certificates of the Village, for inclusion in the transcript of proceedings for the Notes, setting forth the reasonable expectations of the Village regarding the amount and use of all the proceeds of the Notes, the facts, circumstances and estimates on which they are based, and other facts and circumstances relevant to the tax treatment of the interest on the tax status of the Notes.

Section 11. The Clerk-Treasurer of Council is directed to deliver a certified copy of this ordinance to the Delaware County Auditor.

Section 12. This Council determines that all acts and conditions necessary to be done or performed by the Village or to have been performed precedent to and in the issuing of the

Notes in order to make them legal, valid and binding general obligations of the Village have been performed and have been met, or will at the time of delivery of the Notes have been performed and have been met in regular and due form as required by law; that the full faith and credit and general property taxing power (as described in Section 9) of the Village are pledged for the timely payment of the debt charges on the Notes; and that no statutory or constitutional limitation of indebtedness or taxation will have been exceeded in the issuance of the Notes.

Section 13. This Council finds and determines that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this ordinance were taken in an open meeting of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and of any committees that resulted in those formal actions were in meetings open to the public in compliance with the law.

Section 14. This ordinance is declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health and safety of the Village, and for the further reason that this ordinance is required to be immediately effective in order to issue and sell the Notes, which is necessary to enable the Village to timely retire the Outstanding Notes and thereby preserve its credit; wherefore, this ordinance shall be in full force and effect immediately upon its passage.

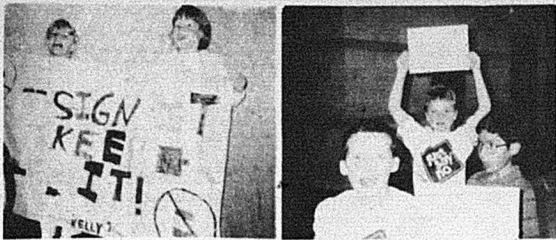

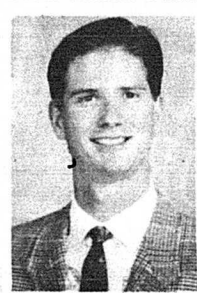

YOUR EYES

IN HARNESS

The classic example, in books and paintings, of working in harmony is often two oxen yoked together to the same harness. There's really a better example closer to hand: your eyes.

Working together, your eyes are able to focus on the same object at the same time. For most people, this is easy and automatic. Sometimes, though, the eyes don't work well together. Then the result may be double vision, a concept the brain rejects. Either the individual overworks his eye muscles trying to get the two eyes to aim at the same object at the same time, or in time, the brain will block out the image seen by one of the eyes. In that case, depth perception is lost.

This problem can be corrected. After careful examination, your optometrist may recommend corrective lenses and/or vision training. Sometimes a prism is added to corrective lenses to alter the image that the eye sees. If vision training is advised, the exercises are usually accomplished in the optometrist's office.
