Besides her mother and step-father, here, Amy is survived by two brothers, Joseph and Michael Mazzola, by her maternal grandparents, John and Betty Walker, Gahanna, and paternal grandparents, George and Anna Dickson, Richmond, Va.; step-grandparents, Lawrence and Connie Mazzola, of Columbus; numerous aunts, uncles and cousins.

Services were held Tuesday morning at Moreland Funeral Home, Westerville, with Pastors Rey Dempsey and Wayne Booth officiating. Burial was made in Sunbury Memorial Park.

'Official' Count
Shows 48% Vote
On BW Tax Issue

"Official" count from the May 4 election shows 48 percent of the registered voters in the Big Walnut School District voted when the 12.5 mill real estate tax went down.


Delaware County Board of Elections reports 3,947 of the school district's 8,000 registered voters cast their ballots on the issue.

The "official" count, certified by the elections board Tuesday, shows the Big Walnut levy failing 2,471-476.

Throughout Delaware County, funds were requested for an off-year special election, committee director Janet Brennenman at the elections office, especially for school issues. Overall voter turnout was 15.75, or 35.35 percent of the 44,579 registered voters.

Other "official" tallies from May 4 show the county-wide Children's Services levy going down, 8,064-4,215 while the Delaware County real estate tax passed, 7,020-1,000.

Delaware County votes for the Buckeye Valley \$14.1 million bond issue show it defeated 1,483-1,397, and Olentangy's 7.9-mill operating levy passed, 3,033-2,120.



Harlem Dept. To Show Off New Fire Station

Dale Flings, Harlem Township Fire Department chief, proudly stands beside the expanded fire station, No. 450, which will be open for tours this Sunday (May 23) from 1-4 p.m.

Flings says fire department personnel, trustees and zoning board officials who have been working in the building, will be on hand to lead tours and answer questions during the informal open house.

Although the expanded fire house has been under construction since last summer, Flings says they wanted to wait until all the "odds and ends" were taken care of before opening the facility to the public.

"I'm pretty proud of this," Flings says. "It took us about four years to get it built."

Voters in November, 1990, okayed financing that project by passing a 2.5-mill (\$60,000) 15-year bond issue.

Construction began in January, 1991, and total cost of the facility was \$675,000, according to Flings.

Before the expansion, the firehouse had 4,100 square feet of space with which to work, but now they have 11,500 square feet.

The expansion includes more space for both fire equipment and meeting rooms, for trustees and zoning board officials, which are upstairs; a kitchen, men's and women's dormitories, for firefighters who spend the night, and a fitness room, which is not yet open.

In addition, the parking lot has been expanded to about four times its original size.

The volunteer firefighters put their personal touches on the station, with interior minor finishes and exterior landscaping.

"I never see us outgrowing this facility. It can hold 10 pieces of equipment, that's the most that many major city fire stations can hold," Flings says.

The Harlem Township Fire Department has six pieces of equipment and 36 volunteer firefighters, five of whom are women.

The Harlem fire station is located at 3883 S.R. 665, just south of Center Village.

Dan, Leslie Duren Restore Victorian-Era Home Here

Dan and Leslie Duren could teach Bob Vila, the home repair handyman, a thing or two about turning a home into a showplace.

The couple are in the last stage of restoring their Victorian home on Ohio Street in Sunbury to represent that era, which lasted from 1837-1901 when Queen Victoria ruled England.

As far as the Durens, the owners of Duren's Dry Goods, Tailored and D.P. Duren Insurance agencies in Sunbury, their house was built between 1865 and 1870. Leslie says she will know more about the exact date once she has time to research it thoroughly at the Community Library in Sunbury.

Leslie probably is used to not having enough time to conduct

research on the house's individual history. Since they bought it in September, 1987, she and Dan have been restoring it to its original representation of a Victorian age home, with their personal touches.

"Leslie saw it completely done (in 1987), all I saw was a lot of work to be done," Dan says.

Now the dream is almost a reality. Leslie says all they have to do is lay a brick patio, restore the barn and replace the tips of the scroll work near the roofline. The Durens have to do six years of restoration, including tearing out walls, stripping and refinishing floors and antique furniture, painting, removing wallpaper, landscaping and making cosmetic improvements on both the inside and outside.

"We didn't think that had been done. We put things back the way

they were at that time," Leslie says. While the Durens are restoring their house, with help from their parents and others, they search the country for antiques.

One of their hobbies is traveling on back roads across the United States, where they sometimes come across little-known antique shops.

With traveling and restoration, get ideas about antiques and restoration by visiting restored houses in historical villages.

Although Leslie and Dan travel to antique fairs and swap meets in order to find antiques, they know what to look for and what to buy. They often find what they need in western New York. Her parents own property between Buffalo, N.Y., and Erie, Pa.

It's now a depressed area, but there are a lot of antiques there, they say.

After buying antique furniture, the Durens can place it near their home. Besides furniture, the couple have a collection of Bob's grandmother designed Doilies hand-crafted by Leslie's grandmother and great-grandmother are placed throughout the Victorian house.

Dan and Leslie have stayed true to the Victorian era by furnishing each


room with antiques from that period. For example, the parlor, one of their favorite rooms, contains a fireplace, a sofa, a chair, a table and a 1901 Stuyvesant piano which is No. 511 of the 1,000 made that year, according to Dan.

The couple do not just put their antiques on display, however; they sit on the antiques furniture just as they would any other. They even allow guests to eat in their parlor while sitting on the Victorian furniture.

"We just want to make things comfortable. We didn't try to make something that it wasn't," Leslie says.

Dan agrees, saying, "This is our

The couple say they have replaced the wooden floor, dry to rot, the box gutters (which are enclosed so that they will not be noticeable,

Leslie says) and the pillar bases.

"The first time they have replaced something on the structure is when they were making 'cosmetic improvements,'" Leslie says.

"We undid things that had been done. We put things back the way they were at that time," she says.
