Gary Keller, coordinator of parochial transportation for Delaware, Licking, Knox and Marion counties has had no report on those students being bused to St. Paul's from the various districts.

Supt. Hylen Souders reported three weeks ago that he had enough from this district signed up for busing to St. Paul's to fill a bus.

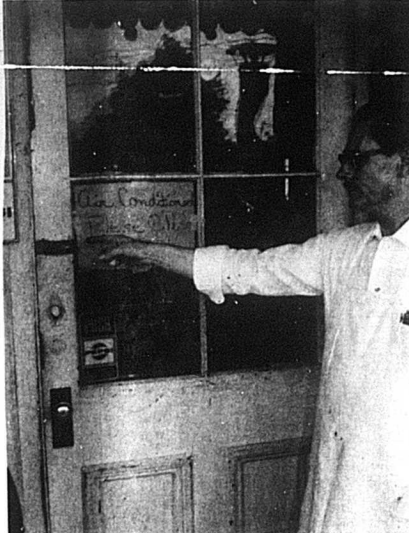

OHIO TEACHER SHORTAGE OFFERS MANY OPPORTUNITY TO TEACH SCHOOL THIS TERM

Shortage of teachers throughout the State of Ohio has finally been recognized by the State Dept. of Education. Estimates of the shortage run from a low of 1,500 to a high of 6,000, according to Maurice Lenz, county superintendent.

To alleviate the shortage, requirements for certified teachers are to be changed, making it

easier for teachers to be certified. A special office at Columbus has been created to review the application of teachers who have not previously been certified. Any person who is interested in teaching and believes he can qualify for any vacancy that exists should contact the superintendent of the school in which the vacancy exists.

Temporary Certificates
Teachers who now hold temporary certificates for substitute service may now teach 90 days for one semester instead of the previous 60 day limit.

Cadet Elementary teachers whose certificates have expired without the completion of 6 or more credits may now obtain a temporary certificate valid for substitute service up to 90 days as mentioned above.

Teachers who are certified in other states will find it possible to become certified in Ohio in many cases.

Any Ohio retired teacher can teach 59 days and still draw retirement pay.

College seniors may be certified and teach part time if they can arrange their college schedules.

Former Teachers Needed
Former teachers who hold lapsed provisionals or higher certificates may be re-certified upon evidence of full-time employment and the recommendation of the employing superintendent.

Proficiency examinations may be given to teachers experienced in a field (such as chemistry or industrial arts) in which they have not completed certification requirements.

Vacancies which exist in the Delaware county schools are:

Big Walnut: High School, chemistry and physics.

Buckeye Valley: First grade, industrial arts.

Liberty Union: First grade, industrial arts, mathematics.

Some schools may need special remedial reading teachers.

Funeral was held in the Snyder-Melick Funeral Home in Centerville Tuesday afternoon and burial was made in Rich Hill Cemetery. Surviving are two sons, Walter of Chillicothe formerly of Olive Green, and Donald of Centerville; a sister, Mrs. Mabel Ledrick of Millersburg; one brother, Ralph Jewell of Centerville; 10 grandchildren and 4 great-grandchildren.

Thieves Get Money At Galena Market

CLOTHES, MONEY, COIN COLLECTIONS TAKEN IN TWO RURAL HOME BURGLARIES NEAR HERE

Rural homes and the Galena Market have been the target for thieves the past week and their loot included cash, jewelry, clothing, coin collections and other things.

Thieves broke into the Galena Market on the south side of the square Saturday night and stole about \$700 that was hidden in a box in the store. Entrance was gained by cutting a hasp on the front door with a bolt cutter. Only the money and box were taken.

Home of Mrs. Lucille Luft on Woodtown Road south of Galena and that of Harry VanSickle north of Berkshire were entered and money, jewelry and clothing were stolen, Sheriff Jackson reports.

Wilson Peer closed the Galena Market at 10:00 Saturday night and found the front door open and the money box gone when he went to open the store at 8:00 o'clock Sunday morning. "The hasp on the front door was cut to gain entrance. They knew where the money was hidden in a box as that was all that was taken," Peer told the News. The market was broken into a year ago when the cash register was stolen. The market is owned by Bill Allerton who has a market in Centerville. Sheriff deputies George Larson and Loren Campbell are investigating the theft.

Mr. Allerton told the News that the thieves took about \$700 in cash. There was a light in front over the door and one inside of the store.

Thieves Ransack House

Thieves ransacked the home of Mrs. Lucille Luft on Woodtown Road southeast of Galena last Wednesday she discovered on returning home from the store that she owns and operates in Westerville, she reported to Sheriff Eugene Jackson.

Entrance was gained by forcing a bedroom window, the Sheriff reports. Women's clothing, rings, collection of old coins and gold pieces and other articles were taken.

Genoa Township To Have New Cemetery

A new cemetery is under construction and will be opened soon one mile north of Westerville at the intersection of the old 3-C Highway with the new Ohio Route 3 in Genoa township. The new 52-acre cemetery will be known as Northlawn Memory Gardens and is headed by Jack Claxton, of 1489 West Lane Avenue, Columbus.

Mr. Claxton said 15 acres of the 52-acre plot will be developed immediately with an investment of approximately \$50,000 in landscaping, access roads and other improvements. "Establishment of Northlawn Memory Gardens," says Mr. Claxton, "will fill a need for a growing Westerville and Central Ohio population that will be come readily apparent in a few short years."

Mr. Claxton also is president of Memory Gardens at Athens, Bucyrus, Pomeroy, Gallopis, Bellefontaine and Cambridge. Several prominent Columbus and Franklin county businessmen are directors and stockholders of Northlawn Memory Gardens.

SCHOOL LUNCHES TO COST MORE THIS YEAR SINCE FEDERAL FREE FOOD IS DECREASED

Charges for school lunches for children and teachers in all schools in Delaware county and city schools will be increased 5c this fall, according to Maurice Lenz, county school superintendent.

Reasons for the increase are rising prices of all foods purchased and a decrease in the amount of free surplus commodities given to the schools.

Last fall schools were given a large amount of surplus hamburger, turkeys, peaches, pears, butter and vegetables. As the conflict with Vietnam progressed the surplus of these commodities decreased until at the end of 1965-66 school year only a few surplus items like rice and beans were available.

Most of the school cafeterias are in the red and with the old

The new charges for lunches after the increase are as follows:

Big Walnut: Elementary grades 1 to 6, 30c; junior high and high school 35c; adults 40c.

Buckeye Valley: Elementary grades 1 to 8, 30c; high school grades 9 to 12, 35c and adults 40c.

Liberty Union: Elementary grades 1 to 8, 35c; high school 40c, adults 45c.

Delaware City: Elementary 30c, grades 7 - 12 35c and adults 40c.

Farm Science Review Has Varied Program

The 1966 Farm Science Preview will be held Sept. 21, 22, 23, at Don Scott Field northwest of Columbus.

There has been a lot of interest in this event since it was initiated. This event does conflict with our Delaware County Fair this year but many people will be able to schedule both events. Tickets are now on sale for the Farm Science Review at the Extension Office and the machinery dealers as well as other farm supply businesses. Tickets purchased in advance are 50c per person. Tickets purchased at the gate are \$1.00. Tickets will be available at the extension office until September 17.

Dale Friday, manager of the Farm Science Review, reports that as of Aug. 9 a total of 155 entries had been received from commercial exhibitors. Friday says that the 288 commercial corn hybrids entries from 28 companies are looking better than any exhibits of any previous years.

Other commercial crop entries include 25 sudan-sorghum varieties; 8 forage sorghums; 14 grain sorghums; 33 alfalfa varieties; and 5 pasture seeding mixtures. Crops to be harvested at the Review include: 200 acres of 20-30- and 40-inch row corn and silage corn; 65 acres of soybeans; over 50 acres of alfalfa. Over 100 acres of land is to be plowed, also.

The grain dryers in action at this year's Review will be in a new location. They are being moved south of Case Road across from the livestock demonstration area. This move will permit the use of some semi-permanent installations for better grain drying demonstrations.

There will be much more to see at the Farm Science Review than mentioned above. Things to see include: all major lines of corn, soybean and forage harvesting equipment; comparisons of harvesting efficiency; plowing, discing, rototilling; comparisons; aerial application of fertilizer; related educational exhibits; livestock research; conservation practices; home economics programs; panorama of

horticulture from flowers to fruit and vegetable processing; and, a full range of farm supplies

and services in nearly 190 exhibits.

The homemakers program will feature the following topics: Test Tubes To Textiles; Families On the Move; New Dietary Patterns; and, Science Answers Laundry Questions.

Interest in the Farm Science

Review extends beyond the farm fences. Presently, a number of urban and agricultural leaders were invited to participate in an Agri-Industry Twilight Review of the Farm Science Review. This event will be held Wednesday, Aug. 24, from 4:00 to 7:45 p.m. Over 60

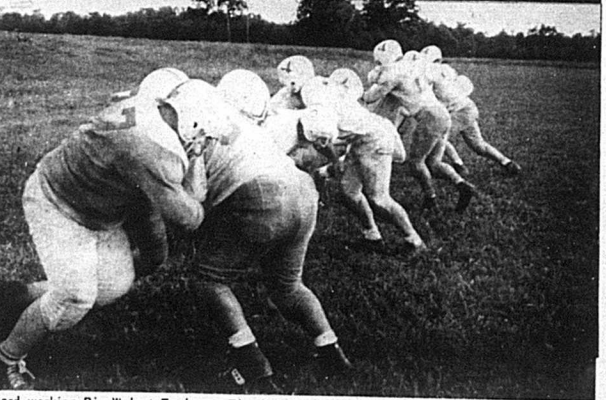
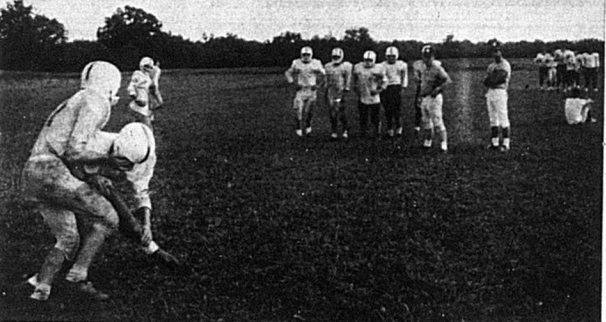
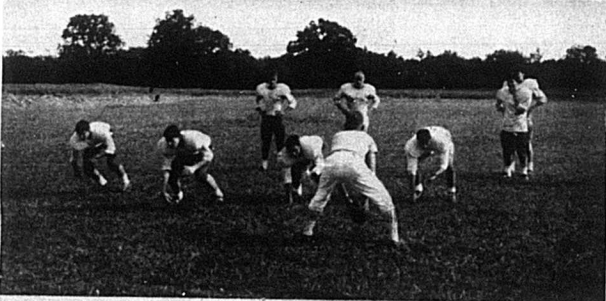
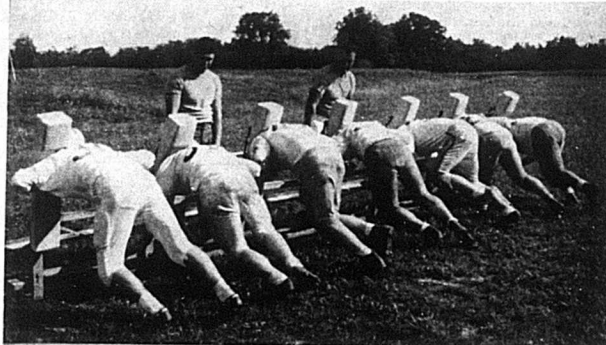
Bronze Star Awarded To T/Sgt. Nettelhorst
