Pruit in that vehicle.

William Martin Flournoy, 27, of Mansfield, pleaded guilty to a 22 year term at Mansfield when his probation was denied. Flournoy entered a guilty plea Mar. 22 to count of information of carrying a concealed weapon.

Flournoy, who picked up by Delaware police Feb. 14 with a .22 calibre derringer in his pocket as he sat in his car on N. Sandusky St., Complainant within an apartment at a second floor trailer complained of a suspicious person parked in front of his apartment.

An 18-year-old Sunbury youth was placed on two year's probation by Judge O. W. Whitney, Jr., Tuesday when he appeared in his first trial on charges of armed robbery. Billy B. Hayes, 21, of 322 Orchard Lane, was charged with one count of daytime burglary for the Oct. 14 break-in at the Lucille Lutti residence, 4350 Harlem Rd. Reported \$683 worth of goods were stolen in that break-in.

Charge of armed robbery was dropped against one of three men indicted Jan. 4 for the December hold-up of Moto 23. County Commissioner of Probation agent Harold T. Wolford, 22, Columbus, when prosecution apparently found not enough evidence available to continue the action.

Wolford, Michael A. Daina, 29, and John Puckett, 37, a native of Columbus, were all indicted on the armed robbery charge after they had allegedly robbed motel manager Jim Grove of \$135 in the hold-up. The three were originally apprehended by Columbus authorities Dec. 17 and indicted Jan. 4. Wolford, who was the only one to make it to trial, was sentenced to 20 years.



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

(Amended. Substitute Senate Joint Resolution No. 3)

JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend section 6 of Article XV of the Constitution of the State of Ohio to authorize a state lottery, the net proceeds of which shall be deposited in the general revenue fund of the state. Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, that the fifths of the members of the house concurring therein, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state in the manner prescribed by law, the following resolution on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May, 1972, a proposal to amend Section 6 of Article XV of the Constitution of Ohio to read as follows:

ARTICLE XV
Section 6. Lotteries, and the sale of lottery tickets, for any purpose whatever, shall forever be prohibited in this state, except by the general assembly may authorize the conduct of state lotteries restricted to the selling of rights to participate therein and the awarding of prizes by draws, when the entire proceeds of such lottery shall be paid into the general revenue fund of the state.

EFFECTIVE DATE AND REPEAL
If adopted by a majority of the electors voting, it shall become effective on the first Monday in January, 1973, and existing Section 6 of Article XV of the Constitution of Ohio shall be repealed from such effective date.

He has also set up an objective guideline for all teachers from kindergarten through the 8th grade. He is continuing this guide line throughout high school.

"This is to assure that some particular child does not miss altogether receiving instruction in any certain area. At the end of the year, a teacher evaluates the progress of each of her pupils. As the child goes on to the following grade, that teacher is made aware of areas in which he needs more instruction and must have to back up somewhat in a particular area to assure him the education he needs. There is a form of a check list given to all teachers in the system.

The curriculum coordinator is in charge of teacher education. Mr. Theaker is serving on the Special Education Governing Board for Better Education of Teachers. He is responsible for the radio OSU telephone hook-up. Big Walnut has one which will be in service in a month. Several telephone lines with other teachers and Ohio State professors to discuss problems and new concepts.

He told how last year Big Walnut updated its English department. In addition to the regular required English I, English II, English III and English IV, the courses now go by such inviting names as Challenge Reading, Some-Else Reading, Let's Learn at Little Man World, Mass Media, Social Communication.

The coordinator is also the one responsible for the parent-teacher conferences and the Open House conducted in the schools.

Mr. Theaker is now working on the North Central Education. The school personnel are presently doing self evaluation. He is looking forward to next year when he has proposed a full day in-service reading school for all teachers of the county and city schools with an outstanding reading teacher to work at each level. Later the teachers will attend mini-courses of one hour each taught by experts. He is also working to update grade cards being used in the school system.

Next year under the direction of Mr. Theaker two new courses will be introduced into Big Walnut—Occupational Work Adjustment and Occupational Work Experience.

He explained the Occupational Work Adjustment (OWA) will be for

The Occupational Work Experience is for 16 years olds and older. A single teacher will converse on an individual basis with these youth and, in doing so, will be communicating daily events in the youth's life. In the afternoon, these teenagers will work at jobs outside the school to gain experience they will have to face later. They will be given a job and a place to work to earn a diploma. There will be no special teachers for these two courses, but some of the teachers available will have to have special training for this type of personal guidance.



Students Visit Eastland Joint Vocational School

Students from the Highland Jr. High School recently visited Eastland Joint Vocational School District #4, Grovetown in Franklin County. The purpose of the trip was to better acquaint the students with vocational education by seeing the kind of training provided by the schools.

The voters of the Highland district and other districts in the Gateway jointure will be voting May 2nd on providing vocational education for the students of the Highland District.

The students and teachers were enthused with vocational education as they toured Eastland. They saw the following programs provided there: Accounting/Bookkeeping, Commercial Photography, Office Machine Operator, Office Printing/Horticulture/Floriculture, Agriculture Business and Service, Agricultural Mechanics, Distributive Education, Occupational Work Experience, Mental Hygiene, Electricity, Electronics, Machine Trades, Mechanical Drafting, Welding, Auto Body Repair, Auto Mechanics, Carpentry, Cosmetology, Laboratory Assistant.

Upon visiting these several things were evident concerning vocational schools. The students' mature behavior indicated much pride and purpose in their program. For these students, school was definitely not a place to go to, but a place where the vast amounts of equipment and facilities that are required. The fact is that vocational schools must be large in order to provide an adequate variety of programs. This is not to be said that the students and job demands in the areas. Students entering into the field of work face several hundred occupational choices. This means vocational schools must be large in order to offer at least the most needed and demanded course areas. The vocational school must be large in order to offer very many of these courses. Each area is quite expensive to equip and could not be economically feasible to have an adequate program in terms of course offering and only a few students in each area. The Eastland J.V.S. is large and they are expanding their

curriculum every year to include additional course areas. The Gateway vocational school will be large enough to offer a wide variety of courses that will meet the needs of the students. Gateway also has a large amount of the time required for only 2.4 miles which is the least expensive route for this district. The Gateway route will cost less but will be most adequate for the students.

The voters in in will offer over forty course areas. "This is a good indication of the superior program that can be offered the students of this area. The 2.4 miles asked to implement the Gateway school will not cost, but will provide a division of community in time," according to committee members. "When students graduate and become property owners and taxpayers their higher income due to the job obtain through vocational schools will greatly enhance the tax base or wealth of the community. At the same time individuals holding the better jobs will be happier, contributing members of the community."

The trip to Eastland took only 75 minutes to go the 50 miles to Grovetown. Gateway will be approximately half as far or approximately 37 to 40 minutes from Highland. Vocational schools can not be located near each local high school.

At the next PTO meeting, April 27, of the Highland Jr. High the topic of vocational schools and more participation will be discussed. Mr. Frank Cochran who is heading up Gateway will be speaking. Parents and those interested in the community are urged to attend.



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
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Buckeye Workshop Scholarship Awarded
