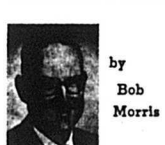

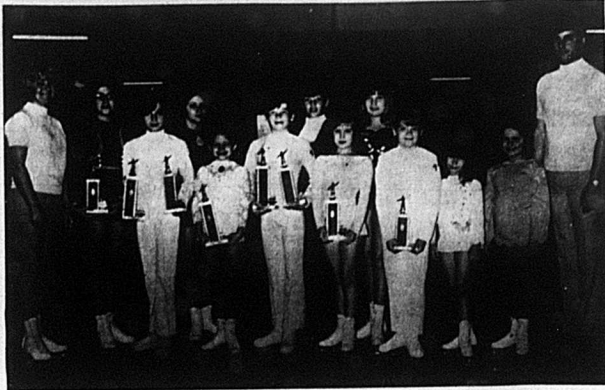

We mentioned a few weeks ago about a new muffin mix on the market for Peach Muffins. Some of us still like to make our breads from scratch and I have located a recipe for making these muffins in your own kitchen.

### Honey Peach Muffins

2 c. enriched flour  
1 T. baking powder  
1 t. salt  
1/4 t. cinnamon  
1 can (8 oz.) cling peaches, drained and finely chopped  
3/4 c. milk  
1/4 c. honey  
1 egg, beaten  
1 T. oil

Stir together dry ingredients. Add peaches to our mixture and toss to mix. Combine milk, honey, egg and oil. Add liquid all at once to flour mixture, stirring only until flour is moistened. Fill greased muffin cups 2/3 full. Bake in 425 degree oven 20 to 25 minutes or until done. This recipe yields 12 muffins.

By the way, the recipe which I am using recommends spooning the flour into the measuring cup rather than scooping it in to avoid packing.

Super Broccoli  
2 pks frozen broccoli, cooked and placed in baking dish  
1 c. cheese whiz  
1 c. mayonnaise

Heat cheese whiz and mayonnaise together and pour over cooked broccoli. Bake 20 minutes in 325 degree oven. Then cover with onion rings and bake 10 minutes more.

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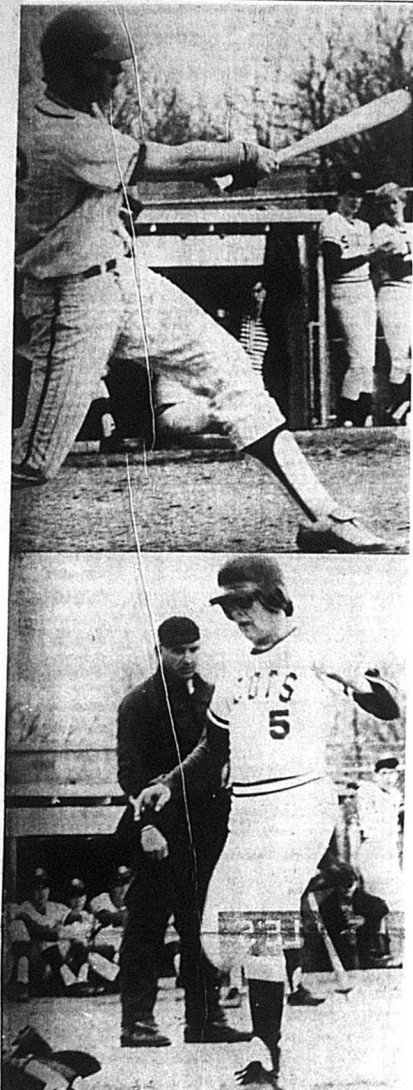

### JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend section 6 of Article XV of the Constitution of the State of Ohio to authorize a state lottery, the net proceeds of which shall be paid into the general revenue fund of the state. Be it resolved by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, three-fifths of the members of each house concurring therein, that there shall be submitted to the electors of the state in the manner prescribed by law at the election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in May, 1972, a proposal to amend Section 6 of Article XV of the Constitution of Ohio to read as follows:

ARTICLE XV  
Section 6. Lotteries, and the sale of lottery tickets, for any purpose whatever, shall forever be prohibited in this State, except that the general assembly may authorize the conduct of state lotteries restricted to the selling of rights to participate therein and the awarding of prizes by drawings when the entire net proceeds of any such lottery are paid into the general revenue fund of the state.

EFFECTIVE DATE AND REPEAL  
If adopted by a majority of the electors voting on this amendment, it shall take effect January 1, 1973, and existing Section 6 of Article XV of the Constitution of Ohio shall be repealed from such effective date.

He has also set up an objective guideline for all teachers from kindergarten through the 8th grade. He will continue this guide line throughout his school.

"This is to assure that some particular child does not miss altogether receiving instruction in any certain area. At the end of the year a teacher evaluates the progress of each of her pupils. As the child goes on to the following grade, that teacher is made aware of areas in which he needs more instruction and may have to back up somewhat in a particular area to assure him the education he needs."

There is a form of a check list given all teachers in the system. The curriculum co-ordinator is in charge of television education. Mr. Theaker is serving on the Special Education Governing Board for Better Education of Teachers. He is responsible for the radio OSU telephone hook-up Big Walnut has over which teachers once a month can get on telephone lines with other teachers and Ohio State professors to discuss problems and new concepts.

He told how last year Big Walnut updated its English department. Instead of former courses termed English I, English II, English III and English IV the courses now go by such inviting names as Challenged Reading, Some-Bias Reading, Let's Look at L.I., Man World, Mass Media, Social Communications, etc.

The coordinator is also the one responsible for the parent-teacher conferences and also the Open House conducted in the schools.

Mr. Theaker is now working on the North Central Evaluation. The school personnel are presently doing self evaluation. He is looking forward to next year when he has proposed a full day in-service reading school for all teachers of the county and city schools with an outstanding reading teacher to speak on each level. Later the teachers will attend mini-courses of one hour each taught by experts. He is also working to update grade cards being used in the school system.

Next year under the direction of Mr. Theaker two new courses will be introduced into Big Walnut--Occupational Work Adjustment and Occupational Work Experience.

He explained the Occupational Work Adjustment (OWA) will be for

youth 13 to 15 years of age. There will be two required classes each morning. The remainder of the day they will assume jobs around the school for which they will be paid. "This is in no way to relieve teachers of responsibilities but to keep the youth interested in staying in school and learning through their work."

The Occupational Work Experience is for 16 years olds and older. A single teacher will converse on an individual basis with these youth each morning, simply communicating concerning daily events in the youth's life. In the afternoon, these teenagers will work at jobs outside the school to gain experience they will have to face later. They will still have had enough class work to be granted a diploma. There will be no special teachers for these two courses, but some of the teachers available will have to have special training for this type of personal guidance.

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## Students Visit Eastland Joint Vocational School

Students from the Highland Jr. High School recently visited Eastland (V.S.D.) Joint Vocational School District at Groveport in Franklin County. The purpose of the trip was to better acquaint the students with vocational education by seeing the kind of training provided by the school.

The voters of the Highland district and other districts in the Gateway Joint will be voting May 2nd on providing vocational education for the students of the Highland District.

The students and teachers were enmeshed with vocational education as they toured Eastland. They saw the following programs provided there: Accounting/Data Processing, High Skill Stenography, Office Machines Operator, Office Printing/Horticulture-Floriculture, Agriculture Business and Service, Agricultural Mechanics, Distributive Education, Occupational Work Experience, Dental Assistant, Electricity, Electronics, Machine Trades, Mechanical Drafting, Welding, Auto Body Repair, Auto Mechanics, Carpentry, Cosmetology, Laboratory Assistant.

Upon visiting there several things were evident concerning vocational schools. The students mature behavior indicated much pride and purpose in their program. For these students, school was definitely meeting their needs. Also evident were the vast amounts of equipment and facilities that are required. The fact is that vocational schools must be large in order to provide an adequate variety of programs or courses are to meet the needs of the students and job demands in the area. Students entering into the field of work face several hundred occupational choices. This means a vocational school must be large in order to offer at least the most needed and demanded course areas. The vocational school must be large in order to offer very many of these courses. Each area is quite expensive to equip. It would not be economically feasible to have an adequate program in terms of course offering and only a few students in each area. The Eastland J.V.S.D. is large and they are expanding their

program next year to include additional course areas. The Gateway vocational school will be large enough to offer a wide variety of courses that will meet the needs of the students. Gateway is also a large enough area that the tax required is only 2.4 mills which is the least expensive route for the district. The Gateway route will cost less but will be most adequate for the students.

Gateway, if voted in, will offer over forty course areas. "This is a good indication of the superior program that can be offered the students of this area. The 2.4 mills school will not cost, but will pay big dividends to the community in time," according to committee members. "When students graduate and become property owners and taxpayers their higher income due to high skills obtained through vocational schools will greatly enhance the tax base or wealth of the community. At the same time, individuals holding the better jobs will be happier, contributing members of our society."

The trip to Eastland took only 75 minutes to go the 50 miles to Groveport. Gateway will be approximately half as far or approximately 37 to 40 minutes from Highland. Vocational schools can not be located near each local high school.

At the next PTO meeting, Apr. 27, of the Highland Jr. High the topic of vocational schools and more business Gateway will be discussed. Mr. Frank Cochran who is heading up Gateway will be speaking. Parents and those interested in the community are urged to attend.

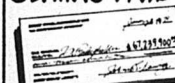

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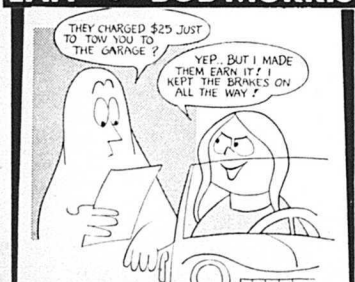
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
