There are many interesting books on the shelves of Community Library, many of them new and ready for the public to enjoy.

The Great American Novel, by Philip Roth. This is a story of the Ruppert Mundys, the only homeless big league baseball team in American history, whose wretched players were once members of the Communist League. The team, which in its heyday had won three world series, is now a pariah, its star player, Kenneth Mundy, is destroyed, a tragic victim of the American mania for success and phobias of failure.

Probably the most intensely imagined and relentlessly comic novel of Roth's writing career.

Evening in Byzantine, by Irwin Shaw. Jesse Craig is the unforgettable hero of this book. A film producer of great ability, he is forty-eight and has reached a crossroads in his life.

He is assailed by mounting pressures, a shattered marriage, two daughters whom he hardly knows, a chic but insistent mistress; and a familiar world disintegrating around him.

While the Cannes Film Festival, he is interviewed by a lovely young reporter. Responding to her searching questions, he begins a careful reexamination of his past and the world. Setting himself free from his past, he begins to look forward to the future, a splendid and certain man.

2 1/2 c. red cinnamon candies

2 c. boiling water

1/2 c. chopped nuts

Dissolve candies in boiling water.

Make following sauce in double boiler:

3 T. butter

1 1/2 c. half and half

3 T. flour

1/2 t. salt

1/2 t. pepper

Add 1/2 lb. fresh or canned shrimp, 1/4 c. mushrooms, 1 small

onion, 1/2 c. diced celery, 1/2 c. grated cheese.

If fresh mushrooms are used, fry in butter first.



Last month, the cubs participated in a "Clean Up Day" and gathered many bags of trash.


Marengo Couple Exchange Vows

Seasonings In A Bland Diet? . . .

For certain gastric disorders a BLAND DIET is often prescribed -- avoiding all highly seasoned foods.

Formerly, it was generally held that seasonings caused irritation of the digestive system, though this notion had no scientific support.

Recent clinical studies disclose that not all spices are bad. For example, Cinnamon, Allspice, Mace, Thyme, Pepper, Nutmeg and Nutmeg are still considered harmful in certain cases.



Dognappers in Area

Unless you've lost a dog or cat, you may not be aware, but there are dognappers in the area and the members of the Humane Society of Delaware County recently got to know them.

"We recently got a report of

five well-bred dogs stolen from

one county road near Interstate 71

and three were reported two months

ago apparently stolen from one

street in Westerville," said Mrs.

Rosemary Vise, president of the

Humane Society.

At its meeting held Thursday,

May 10, members of the society

voted unanimously to offer a reward

of \$500 for information leading to the

arrest and conviction of any per-

son who has stolen a dog or cat. Added Mrs. Vise, "It's really a racket. Dognappers will usually stake out an area before stealing the animal and then in an unobtrusive manner, if a person sees an suspicious car parked for a lengthy period of time on more than one occasion in an area where dogs come up missing, he should note the license number. Or for a good description of the car, can or truck all of which are used."

Dognappers are primarily after purebred or the popular mixed-breed dogs such as cock-a-poo because they have high market value even

without papers.

At the meeting members also decided to begin a campaign to inform college students who have pets they don't want to take home for the summer what can be done for them. Said member Mrs. Barbara Patterson, "There have been too many years when the schools closed and the dogs and cats were shoved out on the city streets to feed for themselves. In instances like this, taken in by some kind persons, they usually end up at the dog pound and are eventually euthanized."

California Reading Tests Given

California Reading Tests were

given to approximately 2,000 stu-

dents in the Big Walnut School

System last week.

Three short reading tests were given to all students in grades 1 through 11. The tests are taken in five separate classrooms in the high school. The elementary and middle school students take the tests in their regular regular rooms.

The 50 minute test consists of two parts, one part on vocabulary and the other on reading comprehension.

The tests measure a student's ability to read and comprehend with results given by year and month level. An average sophomore taking the test should score 10.8 meaning ten years and eight months of school at the time of the test.

The results go to a student's permanent record and are used to evaluate the students abilities. The main use by teachers is to compare a student's grade with the scores on the test. Scores should reflect the scores on the test. Any big difference indicates problems other than reading. The need for a parent-teacher conference may then be indicated.
