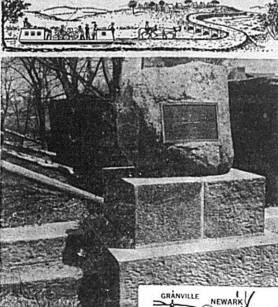

LET'S EXPLORE OHIO



How is where the Canal Erie Ohio started just one hundred thirty-eight years ago, some three miles southeast of Newark on Rt. 75, where this monument and the stone work of a lock stand between the highway.

Governor DeWitt Clinton of New York, father of the Erie Canal, turned the first spade of earth on the Ohio Canal at this point July 4, 1825.

In the next few years, the Ohio Canal connected Lake Erie at Cleveland with the Ohio River at Portsmouth. Licking County more than doubled in population between 1820 and 1840 when the Ohio Canal provided economical water transportation between inland Ohio and distant markets for farm crops and industrial products.

Visitors today can enjoy many backroad trips along the



1000 miles of Ohio's old canals. At Newark, works of the prehistoric Moundbuilders cover some three or four square miles. These earthworks, including circular patterns and effigy mounds, such as the famed Eagle Mound, are the most extensive and diversified of any of the 10,000 and more Moundbuilders' works in Ohio. The Ohio State Historical Society's Museum on Ohio State University's campus at Columbus, has a fine collection of Moundbuilder artifacts and relics of this ancient civilization.

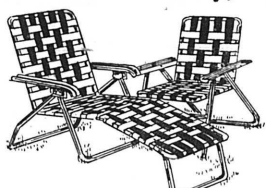

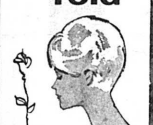
