BST Firemen were called out at 1:20 Tuesday afternoon to put out a truck fire on Letts Avenue that burned the tires on the rear of a pickup truck and threatened to set fire to a tar kettle hitched to the truck.

The truck belonged to Neil Shoemaker of Croton who was going to blacktop the drive for Mrs. Helen Kohberger on Letts Avenue and parked the truck in front of her house. Shortly after parking the truck in front of her house, he asked Mrs. Kohberger to call the fire department as his truck was on fire. Danny Meyers was mowing a lawn and saw the fire and called to Mr. Shoemaker.

The rear tires of the truck were burned off and some damage was caused to the tar kettle hitched to it. Gasoline cans in the truck did not catch fire. Shoemaker does not know what started the blaze.

Shoemaker thinks it was a bad day for him as, while firemen were saving his truck, he received a call that his son, Jim, fell on a bicycle while visiting his uncle Dale Holland on North Columbus Street and it took 17 stitches to close the cut.

Dwight Hall works with Shoemaker and they finished the driveway Tuesday afternoon.

## ROBBERS TAKE CIGARETTES, CANDY AT IGA; HOKE SAFE CONTAINED CASH, STORE RECORDS

Thieves were active in Sunbury Tuesday night and stole a safe and a TV from Hoke Electric and cigarettes and candy from the Sunbury IGA Super Market.

Entrance to Hokes was gained by forcing a rear door. The heavy safe in the office was taken out a side door. A colored TV was taken from the show room. The safe contained all of the firm's records and about \$600 in cash.

The cigarette counter at the IGA Market was completely emptied and a lot of candy was taken. Entrance to the building was gained by forcing a door in the produce room. The theft was discovered by Mrs. Vivian Evans, employee, yesterday morning. She saw that the cigarette display was empty and asked George Main, manager, if he had sold all of the cigarettes.

Mr. Main estimates that about \$300 in cigarettes and candy were taken. This store has been broken into several times.

Hoke's has been broken into three times in the last few years. Thieves took the safe out a side door. All of the firm's records, about \$600 in cash and some checks were in it.

Hoke's collect for Columbia Gas of Ohio and Columbus & Southern Ohio Electric Co. in this area. "I just sent the gas and electric accounts in yesterday," Mrs. Hoke told the News.

Ted Budnick, Sunbury policeman, told that he stopped at Hoke's at 1:00 o'clock Wednesday morning and everything was ok. He was checking with residents of the community to see if they heard any unusual noises when the News was investigating the robbery.

Included in Hoke's safe was a federal check for \$18,371.84 tax refund which he planned to take to the collector of internal revenue today. Mr. Hoke received the check Friday and knew that it was an error. "We never paid anything like that," he told.

"We can't find anything else that they took," Mr. Hoke told the News.

## Voters to Decide School, Zoning Issues This Fall

Delaware county voters will have several bond issues and levies to vote on at the November election this fall and other issues are expected to be filed with the Delaware county Board of Elections before the deadline Sept. 15.

Several issues have been filed with the county Board of Elections and these are listed in the following:

Galena Village has filed a 2-mill operating levy for two years. This is a renewal of the present levy.

### Township Voting on Zoning

Porter, Kingston and Radnor townships are voting on zoning.

Scioto township is voting on a 1/4-mill fire levy renewal and 55 mill increase for 5 years.

Centerburg School District is voting on an operating levy of 23 mills for ten years; this a reduction of 5-tenths of the present levy.

Westerville City School District is voting on a \$275,000 bond issue for 23 years to build a new school and a new 5-mill operating levy for current expenses.

Dublin School is voting on a

1/2 mill levy for 5 years to buy land for a new school.

### Two Vocational School Issues

Two vocational school issues will be submitted to voters in November. Mount Builders Vocational School in Licking county and Knox County Joint Vocational School.

Mount Builders School calls for a bond issue of \$1,460,000 for purchase of site and 35-hundredths of a mill operating levy for 20 years.

This vocational school is made up of school districts in Licking, Fairfield, Muskingum, Knox, Delaware, Franklin and Perry counties. Only a small part of Delaware county is included along the county line in Trenton township that is in the Johnstown School District.

Knox County Joint Vocational School calls for a bond issue of \$1,350,000 and 9-tenths of a mill operating levy for 20 years. This includes Knox, Delaware, Licking, Holmes, Coshocton and Morrow counties. The school is in Delaware county in the Centerburg and Highland School Districts in Porter township.

The Delaware county vocational school will not be voted on this fall.

### Galena Cigarette Machine Stolen

Cigarette Machine was stolen from the cafeteria at the Galena Shale Tile & Brick Company after midnight Saturday it was reported to Sheriff Eugene Jackson. "They generally break the machines, take the money and cigarettes but this is the first time that they have taken machine and all," Deputy Sheriff Orville Tossey told the News.

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## Community Library Offers You Much Reference Material In History

This is a time when we are running on "The Community Library." These articles are being written for the subscribers to give the public a better understanding of the wealth of good material which our library offers its readers.

This week's article is concentrated on the historical and biographical sections of the shelves.

In history the library offers a very complete section of Ohio history, the Civil War, World War I and World War II. Also found are many volumes on Russia, China and other major countries in Europe and Asia. For general history reference there is the complete set of "New Cambridge Modern History," and also "Documents of American History." There are many books on the Civil War by Bruce Gato, the latest work being "Never Call Retreat." Other Civil War books include "The Blue and the Gray" and "Andersonville."

"Pageant of America" is a set of 14 volumes. "History of Western Civilizations" is also a good reference for European history.

**Sunbury History Available**  
In the Ohio history is a set of volumes called "History on the State of Ohio." The library also did much research prior to the Sesquicentennial on Ohio history, more particularly Delaware county and Sunbury history. A permanent record is being made of all they found to be kept in the Community Library.

Some of the newest books purchased in the field of history are "Waging Peace" by Dwight D. Eisenhower, "The American, The National Experience" by Boorstin and "The Shackles of Power" by John Dos Passos. Among the books on World War II are "Battle Hymn," "D-Day," "Hiroshima Diary," "P.T. 109," "They Were Expensible," "Two Jims," "Baa Baa Black Sheep," "Through the Valley of the Kwa," and "The Berlin Story." More recent is "Vietnam Diary."

Outside the history but closely connected with it, is the biographical section. There are scores of biographies concerning historical figures. One of the latest is "William Howard Taft, Chief Justice" by Mason; also "Churchill's Last Year" by Roy Howells.

### Books on President Kennedy

Of interest to many are three books of J. F. Kennedy: "Torch Is Passed," Sorenson's "Kennedy" and "A Thousand Days" by Schlesinger. Also offered are records of Kennedy's speeches. There are thirteen biographies

about J. F. Kennedy. There are sixteen biographies about Abraham Lincoln. Then two on President Johnson and Mrs. Johnson which are timely are "LBJ Country" and "Mrs. LBJ."

One can find biographies on Prince Philip, Queen Elizabeth, Dr. Schweitzer, Winston Churchill, Henry Ford and Dwight Eisenhower.

### Many Biographies of Actors

Many volumes are biographies of actors including Groucho Marx, Zsa Zsa Gabor, Marilyn Monroe, Jean Harlow, Clark Gable, Charlie Chaplin. TV personalities such as Art Linkletter, the Lennon Sisters, Bob Hope, Jack Paar are all represented in the biography section. "Win at My Back" by Pat O'Brian is a favorite. There are volumes on Will Rogers and Mark Twain.

For those wishing to use it, is the "Dictionary of American Biography."

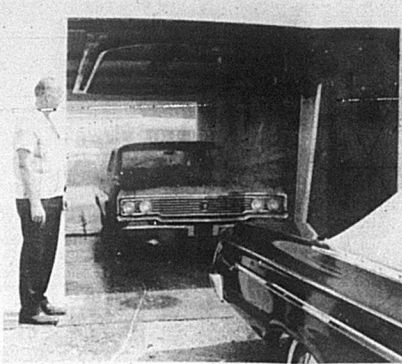

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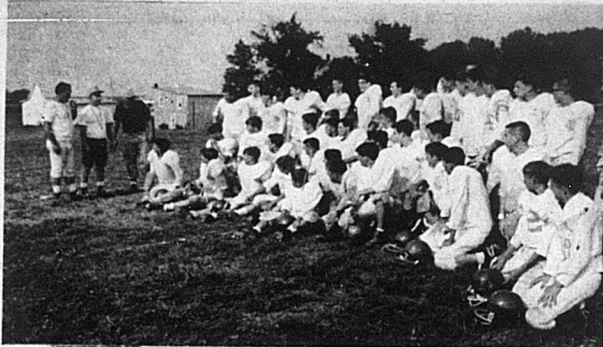

## COUNTY HAS NEW ASC COMMITTEE

This is the new Delaware county ASC Committee. They are James Fleming of Brown township, Earl Musard, and Earl Ward of Delaware township. In taking office, Mr. Fleming, the chairman, made this statement:

"The committee's aims are (1) good service, fairness to farmers; (2) desire to make programs successful in improving farm income and strengthening the business of the county; and (3) stop waste of soil and water resources, needed for future survival."

Farmers are chosen to serve as the county committee by ASC community committees throughout the county, who are elected by their neighbors in annual nonpolitical elections, under legal provisions administered by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Terms of office for county committees were established last year on a three-year term basis with one new member being elected each year for 3 years.

In addition, first and second alternates are elected for 1 year each. Of the Delaware county committee, Mr. Fleming is serving his second year of a 3 year term, Mr. Musard is serving his second year, and Mr. Ward was re-elected this year. The newly elected alternates are Clyde Liming of Berkshire township, and Lawrence Colfish of Brown township.

The farmer-committee system is unique. No other group of citizens has so direct a voice in running Government programs.

The elected committees have responsibility for the county administration of federal programs, including expenditures of federal funds, but they are not federal officers. Congress holds the Department of Agriculture responsible, and the department in turn relies on the judgment and leadership of the locally elected farmers and the county office employees. The county office serves as the headquarters for farmer business connected with program participation.

Major ASC activities in Delaware county include the Agricultural Conservation Program, price-support loans on corn and wheat, the feed grain programs and the wheat program.

Gas Customers May Spread Costs Over Year
