

## Galena Physician Moves Office; To Limit Practice to Appointments



Dr. L. M. Ihle has sold his property on the west side of the Galena square and is establishing an office in his home on Sunbury Road where he will practice medicine by appointment only, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Dr. Ihle came to Galena in 1933 after graduating from Ohio State

University School of Medicine in 1932. He purchased the old Dustin home on the west side of the square in Galena in 1954 and after refurbishing the old home built in 1826, moved his office into it. He has sold the home to James W. Whitney, attorney, of Columbus, formerly of Sunbury.

With this move into his home office, Dr. Ihle is slowing down much in medical care. He says that he now sees only 180 babies since he started practice. Many of these were delivered in homes and many he delivered in various hospitals. "I never had an infection at time of delivery in a home, but have had two in the hospital," he said.

### Clerk of Courts Reiterates Hours

Delaware county Clerk of Courts office is closed on Saturday afternoons. Rev. G. Scott announced last week that an amended state law passed last summer enables the office to shorten its hours to five days a week.

Mrs. Scott said anyone wishing to get a marriage certificate, fishing and fishing licenses, real estate licenses, passports, notary commissions or wishes to pay support must now go to the office between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Office hours appearing in last week's News were wrong, and the daily hours have not been shortened, according to Mrs. Scott.

### County to Replace Harlem Road Bridge; Opens Green-Cook Rd.

County crews started work on replacing the bridge on Harlem Road between Woodmen and Sunbury Rd. this week and Engineer Fred Stults says he expects to have the road closed for the next five weeks.

Stults told the News commissioners authorized work on the bridge Monday and approved an estimate of \$19,532 for the project.

Stults also added that his crews are finishing up work on a bridge on Green-Cook Rd. south of Woodmen this week. "We won't have both roads closed at the same time so we won't inconvenience people in the same area," Stults said.

### BST Firemen Report Little Damage from Fires Monday, Tuesday

BST firemen answered three calls Monday and Tuesday with little damage caused at any one of the fires.

Monday morning, 11:20 alarm called the firemen to the intersection of SR 37 and Green-Cook Rd. where a grass fire had gotten out of control in a field. 
The wholesale beef carcasses dropped in price 5.3¢ per pound between Feb. 11 and the first of April to make possible this lower price of prices at the retail source.

# Break Ground Sunday for Berlin Presbyterian Church

## WILL BE FOURTH CHURCH BUILDING CONSTRUCTED SINCE ORGANIZATION IN 1829

Berlin Presbyterian Church will hold its ground breaking ceremony this Sunday at 12 noon for their new home to be located on county road 10 the north of the Lewis Center Road.

Construction will start immediately on the \$100,000.00 church with Henry Hansen, a member of the church, the general contractor.

The building will be located on the east side of county road 10 with the sanctuary seating approximately 150 to the right and the educational wing to the left. The wing will include a large equipped kitchen and will be provided with sliding doors so that the hall can be used as a large dining area or closed off into individual Sunday School rooms.

Harold Phinney, church treasurer, designed the church. It will be constructed of red brick and stone in the colonial style. A large parking area is included in the design.

Taking part in the ground breaking will be the minister, Rev. J. M. Wilson, and members of the board of trustees and elders. Trustees are Edward James, Mrs. Emerson Shuster, Mrs. Katherine Hall, Mrs. Denver McGhee, Henry Hansen and Charles Hale.

Those now serving on the Session are Harlan Showers, Paul Wilkinson, Mr. Charles Hall, Mrs. Shannon McGhee, Clark Hammelberg and W. L. Pierce, the clerk.

The present church home south

nized in October 1829. The first

### Johnson-Greene to Relocate Dam Roads

U. S. Army Corps of Engineers announced last week that Johnson-Greene Co., contractor for the Alum Creek Dam project, submitted the only bid for the relocation of parts of county roads 10, 11, and Big Walnut Rd. around the dam.

The Michigan based firm submitted a bid of \$581,856.40 for the relocation of approximately 13,100 feet of county roads, including a three-span bridge across the valley below the actual dam.

The actual project is expected to begin within the next week or so and is scheduled for completion within eight months. Corps said that the bid will be opened May 3 on the relocation of 1.5 miles of Cheshire Rd. and the construction of two bridges on it.

Landmark Holds Open House for Fertilizer Blend Plant

Condit Branch of Delaware County Landmark is holding an Open House Tuesday evening to show area farmers their new Fertilizer Blend plant. Open house is set to begin at 7 p.m. and will include educational type meeting with Landmark officials followed by a plant inspection by all who attend.

The new addition to Landmire offers the blending of four fertilizers in dry bulk. Condit Manager Russell Longshore told the News the blend

plant will be able to mix any combination of 18-46-0, Di-Mon, 0-46-0, Triple Super Phosphate, 0-0-61 Potash, and 34% Ammonium Nitrate.

Longshore hopes to create more interest in the use of blended fertilizer among our area farmers. "Longshore said, "and so our educational meeting will inform what the blend can do and how it will benefit farming."

County Landmark General Manager Dale Bailey told the News the

new plant facility includes a 48x84 foot pole building divided into storage bins and has a 600-ton capacity. Mixer itself is contained in the east portion of the building.

Longshore also said the plant will handle some liquid fertilizer as well, but will primarily offer the dry bulk blended. In the photo above, Longshore, left, is unloading the first railroad car shipment of fertilizer Saturday morning as Bailey looks on.

### JOINT RESOLUTION

Proposing to amend sections 4, 6,

7, 9, 11, 14, 16, and 31 of Article II, section 3 and 16 of Article III, section 2A of Article V to enact new sections 8 and 15 of Article III, and to repeal sections 5, 8, 15, 17, 18, 19, and 25 of Article II, and to amend sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 11, 14, 16, and 31 of Article II, section 3 and 16 of Article III, section 2A of Article V to enact new sections 8 and 15 of Article II, to enact section 1 of Article II, section 2 of Article III, and to amend section 1 of Article II, section 2 of Article III, and to amend section 1 of Article II, section 2 of Article IV, and section 22 of Article IV of the Constitution of Ohio to read as follows:

ARTICLE II

Section 4. No member of the

general assembly shall, during the

term for which he was elected,

unless during such term he resigns

under the state, or any political subdivision thereof, but this provision does not extend to officers under this state, which may be affiliated with the same political party as the person last elected to the seat in which the vacancy occurs.

The school speech therapist is trained and certified to work with all types of speech problems (lip reading, hearing and speech conversion), voice problems, cerebral palsy, cleft palate, etc. However, most therapy is required individual therapy, and time and numbers do not always make it possible to work with these children in the school. "We are fortunate to have Delaware a Speech and Hearing Center where these more infrequent and difficult cases can be referred," Mrs. Sims told.

The school therapist works in small groups of children who are selected by the therapist on the basis of individual needs and/or referrals. They are grouped according to age and the nature of the problem. There are approximately 65-75 children receiving therapy at any given time in the Big Walnut district. These children are drawn from grades kindergarten

through grade 7.

At the present time Mrs. Sims, Speech Therapist, divides her time between Olentangy and Big Walnut School districts with one half of the school year being devoted to each school district and the other half being served full time by Mrs. Marc Creviston.

Funding for the Speech and Hearing program in the schools is primarily provided by the State Department of Special Education. The Delaware County Board of Education employs Mrs. Sims; Mrs. Creviston is employed by the Buckeye Valley Local School Board.

In addition to the work of the therapist in Sunbury Elementary School, Mrs. Sims was working with three different groups. The sound on which the children of the first group were working was "I". They were taught to make the sound correctly, to move the back of the teeth not moving the chin. They played a fish game where all objects pictured on the cards started with an "I" and everytime the person said was unable to supply the correct card, he was sent to the fish tank. The difficulty seemed to be confusing of the "I" and "W" sounds.

Mrs. Sims explained few children need work on vowel sounds as those are the first sounds made by an infant. The second group of children often there is difficulty in carrying over the sound from speaking into the reading field. "The fact that they can make the sound in one instance, does not necessarily follow that they will be able to incorporate it in another situation," Mrs. Sims explained.

The second group was working on "W" at the end of the word. Again the fish game was played using all objects with names starting in "W". Children were told to keep their tongue tight for the sound. They also played concentration with the same cards, requiring the children to repeat the sounds over and over again. One boy had been in speech therapy for a year and had made very definite improvement. Some definite help only a few weeks on some particular sound.

The last group observed Thursday by this writer was a group of first graders. They were having difficulty with "S". In playing their games similar to the other groups, they had to answer "So sorry," which was a mouthful for those having trouble sounding the "S".

The therapist explained it was very difficult to make a child listen to himself. "Most of us can hear defects in other's speech, but fail to hear it in ourselves," she explained. She told the sounds

most often needing work are the "s", "r" and "th" sounds.

The pupils are screened at grade one to pick up any defects. It is easier to correct, the younger the child is when the therapist works with him.

A mirror is used whereby the child not only sees the teacher's mouth formation, but can see whether or not he simulates its position. Many sounds are learned through the feeling of vibration of the larynx.

Mrs. Sims says she works a great deal with the children in just ordinary conversation. As she lists items on the cards for the children, she uses black markers whenever they make an error in that area in which she has attempted to help them. "The regular classroom teacher can do this . . . must concentrate on what the child says. The teacher is the new reading teacher. Mine is working through much patience and understanding to correct errors which have already been established in sound formations."

She also has them write what they hear others say.

The therapist told that approximately 12% of the population has speech defects. Next year Sunbury and Big Walnut districts will each have a speech therapist on a part-time basis, full time therapist through the county office. The amount allowed by the state department is based on school enrollment.

It might be interesting if all adults start listening more carefully to their own children. If we are to benefit from the impression we would all benefit from playing the game with the children.
