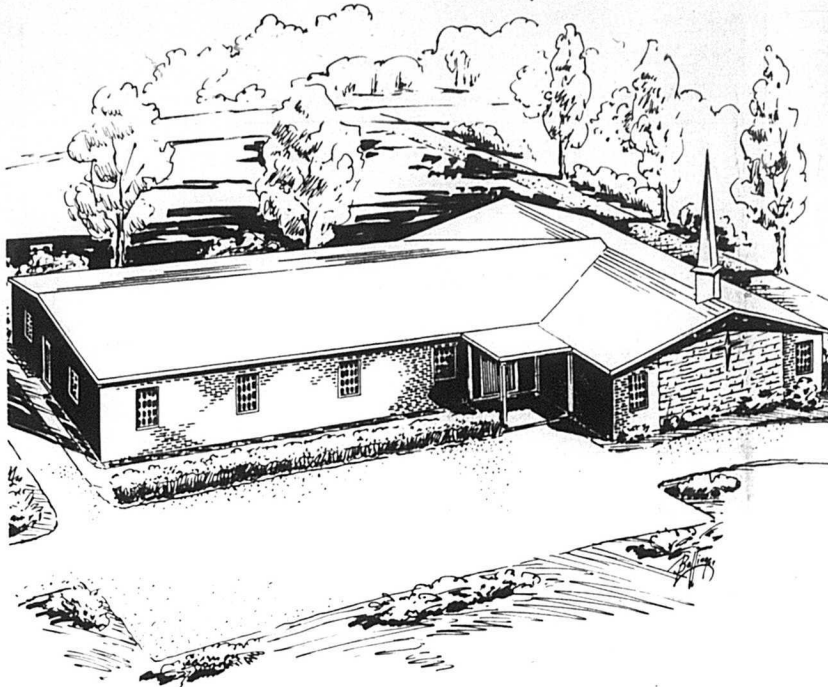

# Break Ground Sunday for Berlin Presbyterian Church

**WILL BE FOURTH CHURCH BUILDING CONSTRUCTED SINCE ORGANIZATION IN 1829**

Berlin Presbyterian Church will hold its ground breaking ceremony this Sunday at 12 noon for their new home to be located on county road 10 north of the Lewis Center Road.

Construction will start immediately on the \$100,000.00 church with Henry Hansen, a member of the church, the general contractor.

The building will be located on the east side of county road 10 with the sanctuary seating approximately 150 to the right and the educational wing to the left. The wing will include a large equipped kitchen and will be provided with sliding doors so that the hall can be used as a large dining area or closed off into individual Sunday School rooms.

Harold Phinney, church treasurer, designed the church. It will be constructed of red brick and stone in the colonial style. A large parking area is included in the design.

Taking part in the ground breaking will be the minister, Rev. J. M. Wilson, and members of the board of trustees and elders. Trustees are Edward Jaycox, chairman, Emerson Shuster, Mrs. Katherine Hall, Mrs. Denver McGhee, Henry Hansen and Charles Hale.

Those now serving on the Session are Harlan Showers, Paul Wilkinson, Mrs. Charles Hall, Miss Shannon McGhee, Clay Ramsdell and W. L. Pierce, the clerk.

The present church home south

of Cheshire on Africa Road has been in use since 1910. The First Pres-

byterian Church of Berlin was organized in October 1829. The first building, a frame, was built in 1830. The church was rebuilt and dedicated Jan. 16, 1876.

The present building to which an annex was constructed in 1957 is having to be abandoned due to the Alum Creek Dam construction. The Army Engineers have not settled with the church as of this date. The congregation has been working during the past year to raise money

Monday's last day of Voter Registration before the May 2 Primary saw 380 people file through the Delaware county Board of Elections office wishing to register.

Total of 628 persons registered the last three days of voter registration for this spring's period

bringing the total unofficial figure of registered voters in the county to 19,334. Girls working in the Elections office will be busy the next few days sorting out duplicate registrations from the main files, before an official figure can be reached.

The total unofficial number registered for last fall's general election was 18,146 and some 300 of those were found to be duplicates, ac-

## Sunbury IGA Lowers Prices In Line with Wholesale Drop

Sunbury IGA is one of the many super markets cutting prices of meat this week in line with the nationwide effort to help stretch the food dollar.

Some meat prices were lowered as much as 26¢ on a pound Tuesday by Gold Circle, IGA and Albers Stores in central Ohio.

According to price tags in Sunbury IGA T-bone, sirloin tip, top round, cube steak, rib steak, chuck steak and bottom round all went down 6¢ per pound. Round and Swiss steak was dropped 4¢.

In roasts, standing ribs dropped 26¢; sirloin tip, 16¢; English, arm, boneless chuck, and heel of round, 6¢; and blade chuck and rump, 4¢. Beef stew solid down 16¢, hearts and tongues, 10¢; beef shank with bone, boneless shank, plate boiling beef, short ribs and neck bone

dropped 6¢. The wholesale beef carcasses dropped in price 5.3¢ per pound between Feb. 11 and the first of April to make possible this lowering of prices-at the retail source.

## Johnson-Greene to Relocate Dam Roads

U. S. Army Corps of Engineers announced last week that Johnson-Greene Co., contractor for the Alum Creek Dam project, submitted the only bid for the relocation of parts of Lewis Center Rd. and Big Walnut Rd. around the dam.

The Michigan based firm submitted a bid of \$581,856.40 for the relocation of approximately 13,100 feet of roadway, including a three-span bridge across the valley below the actual dam.

The actual project is expected to begin within the next week or so and is scheduled for completion within eight months. Corps said that bids will be opened May 3 on the relocation of 1.5 miles of Cheshire Rd. and the construction of two bridges on it.

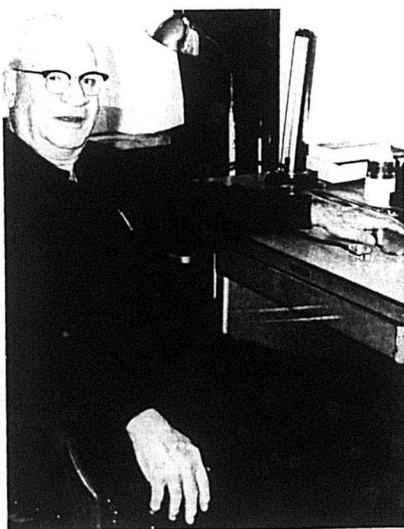

## Galena Physician Moves Office; To Limit Practice to Appointments



Dr. L. M. Ihle has sold his property on the west side of the Galena Square and is establishing an office in his home on Sunbury Road where he will practice medicine by appointment only, on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Dr. Ihle came to Galena in 1933 after graduating from Ohio State

University School of Medicine in 1932. He purchased the old Dustin home on the west side of the square in Galena in 1954 and after refurbishing the old home built in 1826, moved his office into it. He has now sold that property to James W. Whitney, attorney, of Columbus, formerly of Sunbury.

With this move into his home office, Dr. Ihle is slowing down much in medical care. He tells that he has delivered 4180 babies since he started practice. Many of these were delivered in homes and many he delivered in various hospitals. "I never had an infection at time of a delivery in a home, but have had two in the hospitals," he told.

Dr. Ihle has also given many patients anesthesia. He gave anesthesia for 28 years in the hospitals of central Ohio. He has served on the staffs in Mercy Hospital in Columbus, Grant Hospital, White Cross Hospital and Lincoln Memorial Hospital.

The physician whose home was Bethany told that he had to work for

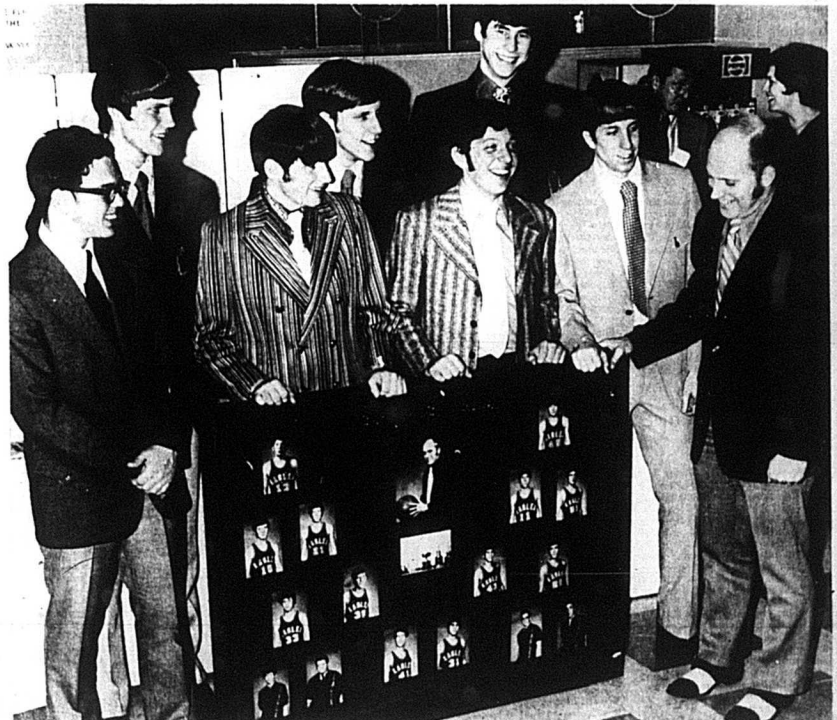
## BST Firemen Report Little Damage from Fires Monday, Tuesday

## Editorially Speaking . . .

## ANOTHER COUNTY DOCTOR PHASING OUT

General practitioners of medicine in rural areas are a rare and fast disappearing breed. Dr. L. M. Ihle is one of the few such physicians remaining in our community and due to his health has been forced to curtail his practice to three days a week.

Dr. Ihle has given long, hard hours of service to his patients in eastern Delaware county and we are glad to see him continue, but do feel he is wise to cut down. Country doctors are on call twenty-four hours a day and we have become accustomed to their coming any time we call them. City physicians will not make these house calls.

We appreciate the 39 years of service Dr. Ihle has given the community and admire him for continuing, even when he does not feel well, to serve his patients on a limited basis.

We hope he enjoys his semi-retirement and will find more time for just plain fun and relaxation.

## YOUTH NEED PREPARATION FOR DEMOCRACY

Eighteen-year-olds are stepping right out of high school into public life since the lowering of the voting age. How is our society changing our training of the youth to prepare them for this immense step?

When a youth enters the public races in our political democracy, he enters a world of much controversy, one which is often cruel and too often dishonest.

Some phase of our educational system is going to be needed in which he, during his junior and senior years, can really experience the benefits, the trials, the disappointments and the "give and take" which running a democracy requires. Is there any better way to give this training than through a student government in high school where he will learn what society will accept, what it will not accept, and what the problems of that society are?

Certainly our high schools must devise a method by which these students are trained in a concentrated way for their early taking up of reins in government.

## Big Walnut to Evaluate, Up-Grade Subject Areas

Big Walnut School will begin a new program of evaluation and grading of prime subject areas and testing-evaluation programs, following Board of Education action Monday night.

Five new standing committees, composed of faculty and administrative personnel, will meet regularly to review and make recommendations for improvement in the areas of science, social studies, mathematics, and language arts, as well as testing-evaluation.

The committees were designed to help teachers gain interest and understanding throughout the district in their subject areas, rather than just being familiar with their own grade level, according to Supt. Hylen Souders who recommended establishment of the committees to the board.

Committees will ask such questions as "Where are our weaknesses, what textbooks are we using or should we use, what improvements can we make?" according to the superintendent. They will report to the superintendent and all groups should use, with improvement, as a member.

"This is an important step forward, glad to see us taking it," was the comment of Board member John Lawrence when the group formally moved to establish the committees.

Board members approved transportation for sixth graders' educational trip to the Mohican Outdoor School in mid-April. Board members spoke highly of the school and the efforts made by students and teachers to pay tuition, so that all children in sixth grade can attend the school.

The board moved to purchase lawn mowing equipment for use throughout the district, for all types of outdoor maintenance. The Jacobson equipment was selected by the board as the low bid.

Dr. Darrell Root, who was to have spoken at the meeting, reported that the district had been able to repay half of the \$30,000 borrowed at the close of 1971 and explained a new reporting form being used to outline the district's financial status and current bills.

During the public participation portion of the meeting, citizens appeared concerning bad road, dress code, and year-round school.

Landmark Holds Open House for Fertilizer Blend Plant

Condit Branch of Delaware County Landmark is holding an Open House Tuesday evening to show area farmers their new Fertilizer Blend plant. Open house is set to begin at 7 p.m. and will include an educational type meeting with Landmark officials followed by a plant inspection by all who attend.

The new addition to Landmark offers the blending of four fertilizers in dry bulk. Condit Manager Russell Longshore told the News the blend

plant will be able to mix any combination of 18-46-0 Di. Mon. 0-46-0 Triple Super Phosphate, 0-0-61 Potash, and 34% Ammonium Nitrate.

"We hope to create more interest in the use of blended fertilizer among our area farmers," Longshore said. "And so our educational meeting will inform what the blend can do and how it will benefit farming."

County Landmark General Manager Dale Bailey told the News the

new plant facility includes a 48x54 foot pole building divided into storage bins and a 600-ton capacity. Mixer itself is contained in the east portion of the building.  
Bailey also said the plant will handle some liquid fertilizer as well, but will primarily offer the dry bulk blend. In the photo above, Longshore, left, is unloading the first railroad car shipment of fertilizer Saturday morning as Bailey looks on.

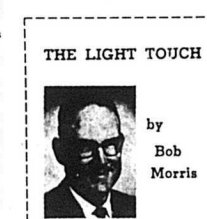

1/2 c. chopped dates or raisins Pour boiling water over oatmeal. Set 20 minutes. Cream well the oleo, sugars and beaten eggs. Add sifted dry ingredients. Add raisins and oatmeal. Bake in 2 nine-inch pans or 1 oblong pan at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. Immediately sprinkle with 1 c. chopped nuts and 1/2 c. flaked coconut.

Boil for 2 minutes 1 c. brown sugar, 1 stick oleo, 1 1/4 c. light cream. Drizzle this through the nuts and coconut on top of the cake. Broil until delicately browned.

Adena State Memorial, off State Route 104 near Chillicothe, boasts this year the partially developed plantation outbuildings of 6th Ohio Governor, Thomas Worthington, in addition to the restored mansion. The springhouse and tenant house (information center) are completed and open. The large Worthington barn will be opened later in the season as livestock, agricultural exhibits and historic fencing are provided. Adult admission to Adena has been increased to \$1.00.

At Zoar, Tuscarawas County, the 1817 communal settlement's blacksmith shop and wagon shed have been reconstructed and open.

Other Zoar public buildings include the Garden house stocked with tropical and native plants, the bakery, linenshop, and the Bismarck House, a restoration. The

village's main public attraction, the Number One House, is presently undergoing restoration and will re-open in a few weeks, when the newly fenced, large central village garden will be ablaze with flowering plants.

Other State Memorials now open are Glendower, Lebanon, Greek Revival style house; U. S. Grant Birthplace, Ft. 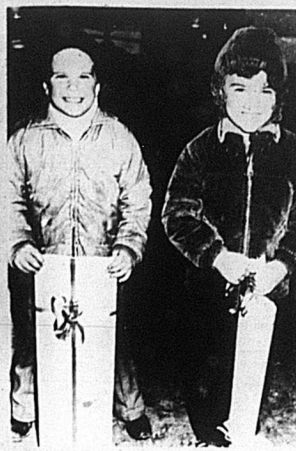
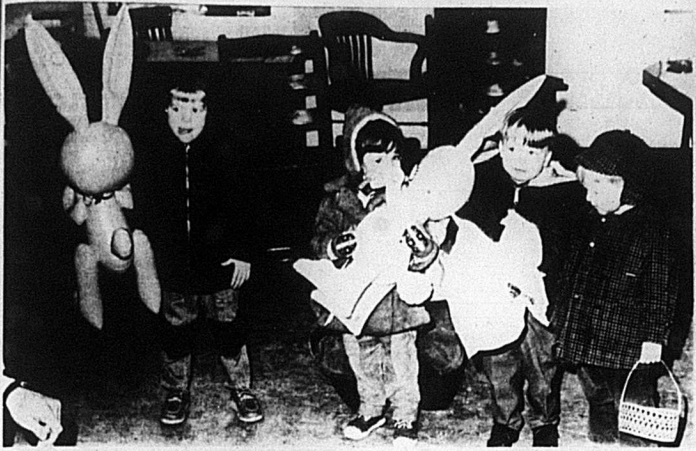

# Speech Therapy

The school speech therapist is trained and certified to work with all types of speech problems (lip reading, hearing and speech conversation), voice problems, cerebral palsy, cleft palate, etc. However, many of these require individual therapy, and time and numbers do not always make it possible to work with these children in the school. "We are fortunate to have in Delaware a Speech and Hearing Center to which these more infrequent and difficult cases can be referred," Mrs. Sims told.

The school therapist works in small groups of children who are selected by the therapist on the basis of grade screenings and teacher referrals. They are grouped according to age and the nature of the problem. There are approximately 65-75 children receiving therapy at any given time in the Big Walnut district. These children are drawn from grades kindergarten

through grade 7.

At the present time Mrs. Sims, Speech Therapist, divides her time between Olenyung and Big Walnut School districts with one half of the school year being devoted to each school district. The Buckeye Valley schools are being served full time by Mrs. Mary Creviston.

Funding for the Speech and Hearing program in the schools is primarily provided by the State Department of Special Education. The Delaware County Board of Education employs Mrs. Sims; Mrs. Creviston is employed by the Buckeye Valley Local School Board.

When I observed the work of the therapist in Sunbury Elementary School, Mrs. Sims was working with three different groups. The sound on which the children of the first group were working was "l". They were told to make the sound by placing the tongue to the back of the teeth not moving the chin. They played a fish game where all objects pictured on the cards started with an "l" and everytime the person asked was unable to supply the card, he only had to incorporate the difficulty seemed to be confusing of the "l" and "w" sounds.

Mrs. Sims explained few children need work on vowel sounds as those are the first sounds made by an infant. However, she told that often there is difficulty in carrying over the sound from speaking into the reading field. "The fact that they can make the sound in one instance, does not necessarily follow they will be able to incorporate it in the other situation," Mrs. Sims explained.

The second group was working on "r" at the end of the word. Again the fish game was played using all objects with names ending in "r". Children were told to keep their tongue light for the sound. They also played concentration with the same cards, requiring the children to repeat the sounds over and over again. One boy had been in speech therapy a whole year and had made very definite improvement. Some need help only a few weeks on some particular sound.

The last group observed Thursday by this writer was a group of first graders. They were having difficulty with "s". In playing their games similar to the other groups, they had to answer "So sorry," which was a mouthful for those having trouble sounding the "s".

The therapist explained it was very difficult to make a child listen to himself. "Most of us can hear defects in other's speech, but to hear it in ourselves," she explained. She told that the sounds

most often needing work are the "s", "r", and "th" sounds.

The pupils are screened at grade one to pick up any defects. It is easier to correct, the younger the child is when the therapist works with him.

A mirror is used whereby the child not only sees the teacher's mouth formation, but can see whether or not he simulates its position. Many sounds are learned through the feeling of vibration of the larynx.

Mrs. Sims says she works a great deal with the children in just ordinary conversation. As she listens to them relating the happenings of the day, she works through much patience and makes an error in that area in which she has attempted to help them.

"The regular classroom teacher cannot do this. She must concentrate on what the child says, rather than how he says it. Her work is teaching a learning process. Mine is working through much patience and understanding to correct errors which have already been established in sound formations." She also has them write what they hear others say.

The therapist told that approximately 12% of the population has speech defects. Next year Olenyung and Big Walnut districts will have its own full time therapist through the county office. The amount allowed by the state department is based on school enrollment. It might be interesting if all adults started listening more closely to their own diction. I was of the impression we would all benefit from playing the game with the children.

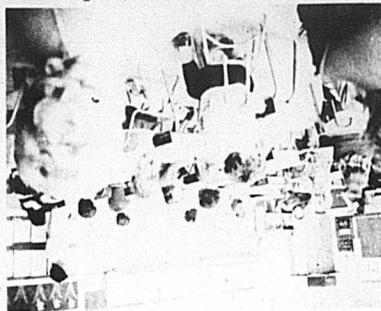
## Sunbury Woman Dies At Daughter's Home

## Like Open Court Reading Series



Two Columbus school principals and three of their teachers were observing reading classes at Sunbury Elementary last week. They were the latest in a growing list of professional visitors to Big Walnut where the new reading series is being used for youngsters in kindergarten through third grade.

People are so amazed at what these first and second graders are doing," comments Sunbury Principal Miss Lucille Nash. She says that is the reaction of Mr. Daniel O'Brien, principal of Eakin Elementary School in Columbus, who was the other visiting principal. Earlier in the month Mr. James M. Dalley, Jr., superintendent of Scioto Valley Schools, expressed his appreciation for the observation.

Teachers made at Sunbury and also commented on their enthusiastic response to the new program. Parents, as well as educators, seem enthusiastic about the results gained from the new program, Miss Nash says. "Parents are overwhelmingly in favor of the series," she reports after parent comments coming from the parent-teacher conferences.

The Sunbury principal also remarks that one student teacher who was in the building last semester said, "I hope I won't have to teach any other type program when I begin teaching."

The Columbus principals observed the series "teaches a lot of responsibility," Miss Nash explains. Instead of the teacher marking an answer "wrong" or telling the student they have made a mistake, children are encouraged to look it up and get facts firm in their own minds.

Students do considerable dictionary work in the program. First graders have individual dictionaries which are part of the series. Second graders each have their own larger dictionaries. Miss Nash feels the reference skills will be invaluable to students as they grow older.

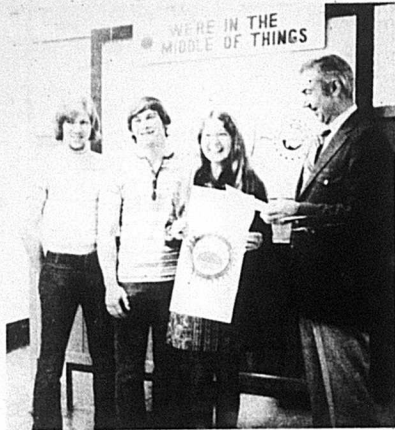
