

Bulldozer Gives Town Resident Cold Day

SUNBURY WITHOUT A SERVICE ONLY SIX HOURS: OHIO FUEL BRINGS A MEN HERE IN EMERGENCY

Sunbury was without a service for six hours Monday after a bulldozer putting in the new water line struck a valve on a 4-inch high pressure main on West Granville Street to shut off all gas coming to the village.

The valve near the regulator station was only cracked but workmen thought that there might be a bad leak so they turned the valve off that stopped all gas coming into town except for the Nestle's plant which receives gas coming it reaches the regulator.

John Taylor of Westerville, district manager for the Ohio Fuel Gas Co. here, was in town shortly after the break and soon had a crew of 42 men from Columbus who were to each consumer to explain the trouble and shut off the gas. Service was restored at 4:10 in the afternoon and the men turned on the gas for each of the 571 patrons in the village and started all their appliances.

Mr. Taylor used the office of Mayor Harold Kintner in the town hall during the emergency. He set up streets for the service men to travel to shut off the gas and to restore service and most of the patrons had gas at 6:00 p. m.

"The gas was only cracked and it was not necessary to shut it off," Mr. Taylor told the News.

News Editor's Guess Finds Break
Earl Bell of Sunbury Cleaners carried the News office to 1920 to see if the gas was on. The editor told it was but when he checked he found that it was off. "I know what's wrong," Editor Bill Whitney exclaimed and told that he would water that the men putting in the water line had hit the gas main. He started out to cover territory where the new water line was being put in and reached the break on West Granville Street shortly before Mr. Taylor arrived.

Most of the village uses gas for heating. Big Walnut Schools were dismissed at noon. Mr. Bell took his staff to his plant in Johnstown where they worked that afternoon. The News could not produce type as gas is used to heat the linotype.

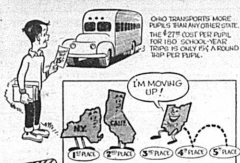
