SEVERAL PHONES RING BUT NO ONE ANSWERS; PROWLER SEEMS TO KNOW WHEN MEN ARE AWAY

Sunbury is on edge with the prowler continuing to try to gain entrance into homes and someone calling on the phone and often playing a record without answering when the phone is answered.

Policeman Jack Wells and deputies from the office of Sheriff Harley Worsthaft have been touring the town all night since the prowler tried to break into the Gene Ellison home a week ago but have not been able to catch him.

The prowler tried to break into a house on South Vernon Street early one morning last week and one on Rainbow Avenue early Tuesday evening. Others report his visits the past week.

Several report phone calls and when they answer all they hear is heavy breathing without an answer. Some claim that records are played when they answer the phone.

The prowler seems to know when men are away from home or when a baby sitter is alone with children as he often strikes them.

Women and children are scared and a group of mothers brought a letter to the editor this week which is being published today.



# SUNBURY MOTHERS WANT QUICK ACTION TO CATCH 'PROWLER' IN LETTER TO NEWS EDITOR

Dear Mr. Whitney:

We extend our heartfelt thanks to The Sunbury News for making an effort to inform the community of our community about "The Man in the Hat." This may be a small town but at the present time, "The Man in the Hat" problem is so rampant, it has to be solved.

Local officials stated (in reference to the article in last week's News) "This was unfortunate and unnecessary." We do not call your attention to the fact that a genuine concern over our town and its people is not a crime. Only awareness can promote active protection.

It is most unfortunate that our former local policeman and mayor have both known about the existence of the "Prowler" and that the past Thursday morning when forced entry was made into the club at 130 E. Main St., Police protection never did come.

The mayor was called within twenty minutes of the incident; and even though he was notified at five o'clock, he did not arrive until six o'clock, after a similar situation on his own street. He was unable to provide any emergency help! It was reportedly said that he was "too busy" to come that night. If so, more than three hours had passed before his appearance and this statement can be verified by six persons. We must surely expect to capture the prowler? Come now, why did he bother to investigate after such a time lapse. One can drive to Cleveland, in two hours time. Had a person been seriously hurt, his chances for survival would have been nil.

We were told by the local policeman that the following morning he personally conversed with the mayor. Yet, there was not one word mentioned in reference to the "forced entry." We surmise that our mayor failed to notify the local police, and thus, "unofficially" publicized. Not until later on that same morning, when Mrs. Ellis, on phoned the Sheriff's office, did our local policeman get the word.

Two men from the Sheriff's department passed on the information to him and an investigation was under way, twelve hours later! Seems trivial, don't you agree, that our county officials had to be the initiator of this investigation in a local matter? By the way, who is on the payroll, anyway?

Many of us have recently met our new local policeman. We feel he is experienced, capable and energetic. But, what good are these assets when they are governed and directed by an unconcerned administrator? You first need a cause to bring about an effect. The effect we want is action!

Furthermore, even when active effort to inform the public is made, it can't be always be reached. After midnight, his is located near Delaware. Even when it is on duty in his patrol car, it is not always in present operation other than by the Sheriff's department.

At this time only upon duty, in convenient, but time consuming, especially in the case of emergency. Our town "Prowler" is aware of our police protection weakness. Isn't the town itself? Why do you suppose "he" has been so bold as to attempt several times within the past few days - since the alert? Why do you suppose "he" "action" has been in continuation for over six months?

Shocking, isn't it, that each of us signing this "Letter of Concernment" has been actively affected. To us, it is a very serious depressing our lives and those of our children have been (and are) at stake. We can not console ourselves with these victims (and we shall) we say, "Ugly Facts!" We fear for the life of every victim and pray that help will come. That is the sole purpose of this letter.

We are but worried and concerned mothers (not policemen or city officials) - and, we do not know all the answers but we do have three important suggestions:

1. Prompt re-location of the Sunbury policeman - local residence.

2. For the present, police patrol all night long... even if day time duty has to be temporarily discontinued.

3. Installation of a short wave radio system enabling patrol car contact locally - eliminating the present time consuming "between" method. If necessary, the mothers of this community are ready and willing to take door-to-door in order to obtain the needed funds to execute this suggestion.

Mr. Whitney, our answer is simple... Action needed immediately! Our question more troublesome and complex... isn't it take rape and murder to promote the action needed?
