

GOP Elects Denune As Party Chairman

Tuesday, May 31, Burrell B.

Porter, chairman of the Delaware County Republican Central Committee at the party's annual reorganization meeting.

Denune, of 4265 Patrick Road, Sunbury, moves from his previous position as central committee vice chairman and replaces John Richards of the city of Delaware. Denune has served as a teacher, and as an instructional coordinator for Columbus Public Schools. His experience in coordinating the use of computers, and word processing with the English curriculum of Columbus Public Schools has recently been an impetus for the local application to computerize much of these data.

Delaware attorney Shelby Hutchins was elected vice chairman of the central committee. His law partner, Jeff Burkham, also of Delaware, was re-elected as central committee treasurer.

Former county auditor, independent Smith Runyan was re-elected central committee secretary, replacing Linda Kiser.

Delaware attorney R. Kenneth Lewis was re-elected executive committee member. Michael Newcomb was elected vice chairman replacing Henry Grotta. Dorothy M. Robe was re-elected as county chairman for the legislative committee.

Arts Center Fund Campaign Tops \$300,000

Over \$300,000 has been pledged to the Campaign for the Delaware County Cultural Arts Center. The announcement was made by William H. Eells, General Chairman for the funding effort.

Eells said, "I am pleased with the generosity shown by contributors." A minimum of \$550,000 is required to purchase, renovate, expand and administer the facility to house the proposed center.

Eells said that he is delighted that businesses and individuals are supporting this program so enthusiastically. This is one of the most remarkable projects to come to Delaware county in recent years. It will benefit people of all ages as a center for the cultural arts." Eells adds.

Jo Kiser, President of the Board of Directors, said, "The first phase is underway to start renovations on the former OWU Lyon Art Hall by September, and that programs should be underway by January 1, 1989."

Eells pointed out that it will be important to visit each individual in the county because of time and the availability of manpower. Council Hears Speed Woes, Fills Vacancy

Sunbury council heard more complaints about traffic and parking on two village streets and filled the vacancy left with the resignation of Richard Sechrist at its meeting last Wednesday.

In two votes, council decided 3-2 to name Leonard R. Weatherby, 809 S. Old 3C, to Sechrist's post. Weatherby was elected over Melvin Beaman on the second vote, while he and Beaman had two votes in the first, with former Mayor Harold Kintner getting the other.

Beamer had been nominated by Doug Luber for the vacancy, while Sechrist, Park Maybew nominated Weatherby. Councilman Ted Forman nominated Kintner, to end all nominations.

Weatherby was sworn in by Mayor Dan Conant, who began his four-year term in January.

Conant named Weatherby to the town's zoning board as council's representative, taking Sechrist's seat. He also appointed councilman Gene Sparks to replace Sechrist on the finance committee, and Forman to take Sechrist's seat on the priorities committee.

Residents from two traffic trouble spots in the village were at council, all exclaiming the same problems aired before council at previous meetings. Warren Owen returned seeking answers to Rainbow Ave. problems, and Randy Hughes and Marvin Lloyd handed in a petition by all residents to one with previous Mayor Doug Luber to look into speed problems along that street, between Laurel Ct. and S.R. 37.

Owen called council's attention to a petition he had presented to the board at its April 7 meeting. That petition had been signed by Rainbow Ave. residents seeking a 4-way stop at Rainbow and Otis St., as a means of slowing traffic down.

Weatherby had ruled out the 4-way stop back at the April meeting and said Sunbury police had run radar on Rainbow and determined there was no real problem.

Owen pointed out that police officer who was in the radar "only

one occasion had done so 'not at a good time,'" and added, "there is a speed problem up there, or people wouldn't have signed the petition."

Owen said he's given council a list of times it would be better to patrol the area, and councilman Forman told him to give such a list to the police.

Lauer asked, "What would you have the police do if you were in our position?" to which Owen

replied, "Put on another cruiser. That's what I understand some candidates told people they'd do last fall."

Mayor Conant said he'd check with police to further study the speed problem on Rainbow, and get back to Owen and council at its next meeting, two weeks.

Owen then pointed out there is "a parking problem still on Rainbow." Forman said he specifically kept an eye on the parking problem and noted, "I feel it is much better, at least a 50 percent improvement."

Owen replied, however, that T-ball has begun at the Big Walnut Intermediate School playground, and "that makes it worse." Forman asked the property owner responsible for keeping parked cars off the sidewalks, or is it the village?"

Solicitor Keith Boger answered, "I wouldn't want to answer that without doing some research."

Owen also asked, "Who is responsible for repair to the sidewalks after these people park on them and tear them up?"

Solicitor Boger replied the cost of repairing always on the property owner.

"If you can prove the damages you have to sue the ones who have parked on them and torn them up."

"I'm not here to make anyone

Sheep Shearing Wraps Up New Zealand Trip

Editor's Note: Big Walnut graduate Jeff Miller recently returned from his 6-month stay in New Zealand as a participant in the International Four-H Youth Exchange. The following is the final column he wrote about his travels "down under." Jeff says he's available for slide presentations and talks about his exchange trip, and can be reached at 439-7796.

My final newsletter from New Zealand wouldn't be complete without another mention of sheep.

The exchange concludes at the International Shearing and Wool-handling Championships in Masterton. The "Golden Shears" was started in 1961 to promote the highest standards of shearing and wool-handling. The competition provides the chance for shearers from New Zealand and around the world to show off their skills.

The competition centers on the shearer's ability to remove the wool from the sheep as quickly as possible. The faster the shearer can accomplish this, the less the wool will be a full grown ewe in less than a minute. Lambs can be shorn even faster, taking around 30 seconds.

Efficiency is just as important as speed. If the shearer doesn't remove all of the wool in his initial pass, he is given a penalty point for each second cut. The other thing that will cost a shearer points is if they nick or cut the sheep hide with their razor sharp blades.

Take all of these judging factors and put six shearers on a stage in a large auditorium, and you have the makings for an exciting competition. All of the shearers that compete at the Golden Shears are some of the best in the world.

They make an extremely difficult job look so easy. It takes a great deal of coordination and dexterity to be able to control a full grown sheep, quickly remove the wool, and still not cut the skin.

The handpiece that the shearer uses is a long extension of his hand. It looks as if the wool is just wiped right off the sheep with each passing blow that the shearer makes.

In a typical day of work a good shearer can do 300-400 ewes or 600 lambs and get paid a cent per ewe and 6 cents per lamb. If you add that up over a year's time it adds up to a tidy little income earned from shearing.

Shearing is tough, sweaty back work. And the men who can make their living from shearing is a highly skilled professional in my book. After having tried my hand at shearing, these people have fully earned my respect for their skills and abilities.

Bits From New Zealand
Every Sunday in New Zealand there are absolutely no commercials on radio or television. I think that an afternoon of NFL games would be like with no commercials!

—There are many ways to enjoy Kiwi fruit, a fuzzy brown, egg shaped fruit. It can be cut in half and scooped out with a spoon, or peeled and sliced and eaten.

Sheep Shearing Is Kiwi National Pastime

Pictured above are Jeff's parents taken at the "Golden Shears" sheep shearing competition as well as other photos taken during his stay in New Zealand.

Top picture was taken at the shearing contest, as contestants shear the sheep on the stage. Jeff says the white-coated men on stage were the ones from the white-coated people below, or "crossies" or "roustabouts," in charge of keeping the stage area clean and free of the wool being clipped.

Second photo shows a sheep being sheared by a man on a ranch. The sheep has a thick coat of hair. The man is using a shearing machine to remove the hair. The sheep is standing on a grassy field.

Bottom photo, Jeff says, is that of a "typical" Kiwi family, with the father standing at Cromwell, South Island. Left to right, are 5-year-old Daniel, 3-year-old Michael, and then 4-mos. Alisa with dad and mom, Ken and Joanne Paterson.

The Patersons own and operate a 27,000-acre Merino sheep station with over 6,000 sheep.

"Their blue eyes are characteristic," says Jeff. "You never see an overweight farmer in New Zealand."

Ken stays trim by walking over his ranch, the same hills over as his 68-year-old mother trains over as she keeps in shape. "She plays competitive field hockey," says Jeff. "And over those same hills to stay in shape," he adds.

mad. Owen said: "These are some of the legal technicalities about sidewalk needs that need to be looked into. That's why I keep coming back."

Owen pointed out several tickets were issued Monday (Memorial Day) when he called police about those parked on the sidewalk. "That's the first day they started (T-ball) and something had to be done."

More tickets were issued by Owen to continue to call police when persons park on the sidewalk. Hughes and Lloyd pointed out Walnut Street is not made for traffic and suggested the speed limit be reduced to 20 mph.

"When I first went here," Hughes said, "that street was gravel, full of chuck holes and we didn't have the problem. Then the town paved it, and now we have problems."

Boger told Lloyd and Hughes that legally, 25 mph is the highest limit allowed on village streets, "unless it is in a school zone."

Labor pointed out: "If the police are going to ticket us, let's do it. No T-ball Trucks signs, at least."

Hughes responded people using Walnut as a shortcut from Laurel Ct. to 37 and "young kids" from the neighbors of speed limit on Walnut.

Lager suggested council, "as a committee-of-the-whole or whatever," look into the two problem areas presented to council Wednesday. "We've had enough people here in the past months really give them more than passing attention."

As far as reports to council, Forman said the street committee is going ahead with the only paving project for this summer, in Sunbury Garage.

And, Mayor Conant pointed out A. E. Stilson & Associates engineer Ronald Huprich and the Board of Public Affairs will be at the next meeting of council June 15, to seek an ordinance allowing the EPA to raise non-residential users' water rates 20-25¢ to pay for the design phase for a new water treatment plant and reservoir for the village.




