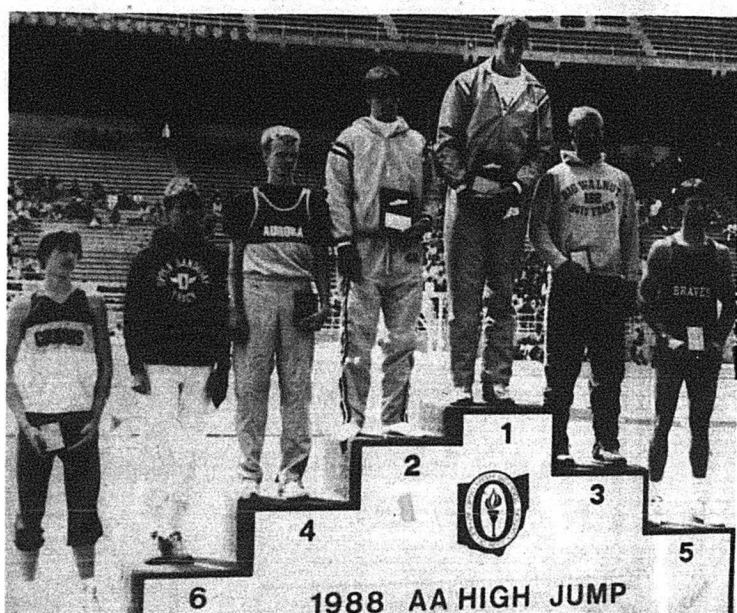

Make Benefit Dinner Plans for Injured Fireman

Four months after a fire routed the Richard Hill family from their home on Blue Church Rd., they hope to be back in.

But, a Porter twp. fireman, who fell from the Hills' roof while fighting that blaze, remains out of work, and has no hopes of getting back to work before the end of the year.

That's why firemen around Delaware county are selling tickets for a June 25 benefit to help Porter fireman Rick Lewis. The Men's Club of St. John Neumann Catholic Church is sponsoring the chicken dinner benefit.

Porter fireman and trustee, and member of the Catholic men's group, Ed Ambrose, says Lewis crushed a vertebrae when he fell onto concrete steps from the roof of Hill's 2-story home.

"Rick is a heavy equipment operator and he's out of work at least for the rest of the year," Ambrose says. "Sure he's supposed to get workers' compensation and all that, but he hasn't got any yet, and we're planning to help him out."

The early morning blaze routed the Hills from their beds on Mar. 17. Richard told The News last week, they hope to be back in their rebuilt home next month.

GOP Elects Denune As Party Chairman

Tuesday, May 31, Burrell B. Denune of Porter township was elected chairman of the Delaware County Republican Central Committee at the party's bi-annual reorganizational meeting.

Denune, of 4265 Patrick Road, Sunbury, moves from his previous post as central committee vice chairman, and replaces John Richards of the city of Delaware. Denune has served as a teacher, and as an Instructional Coordinator for Columbus Public Schools. His experience in coordinating the use of computers, and word processing within the English curriculum of Columbus Public Schools has recently been on impetus for the local Republicans to computerize much of their data.

Delaware attorney Shelby Hutcheson was elected vice chairman. Denune was elected vice chairman, replacing Linda Kiser.

Delaware attorney R. Kenneth Kunkel was re-elected executive committee chairman. Michael S. Newcomb was elected vice chairman replacing Henry Grotta. Dorothy M. Robe was re-elected as county chairman for the executive committee, while Virginia Sheets and Grace Newhouse were tapped as at-large members.

Arts Center Fund Campaign Tops \$300,000

Over \$300,000 has been pledged to the Campaign for the Delaware County Cultural Arts Center. The announcement was made by William H. Ellis, General Chairman for the fund-raising effort.

Ellis said, "I am pleased with the generosity shown by contributors. A minimum of \$500,000 is required to purchase, renovate, equip and endow a facility to house the proposed center."

Ellis said that he is delighted that businesses and individuals are supporting this program so enthusiastically. "This is one of the most worthwhile projects to come to Delaware county in recent years. It will benefit people of all ages as a center for the cultural arts," Ellis adds.

C. Joy Kaser, President of the Board of Trustees has indicated that plans are underway to start renovations on the former OWU Lyon Hall by September and that programs should be underway by January 1, 1989.

Ellis pointed out that it will be impossible to visit each individual in the county because of time and the availability of manpower. Council Hears Speed Woes, Fills Vacancy

Sunbury council heard more complaints about traffic and parking on two village streets and filled the vacancy left with the resignation of Richard Sechrist at its meeting last Wednesday.

In two votes, council decided 3-2 to name Leonard R. Weatherby, 800 S. Old 3C, to Sechrist's post. Weatherby was elected over Melody Bean in the second vote, while he and Bean each had two votes in the first, with former Mayor Harold Kintner getting the other.

Bean had been nominated by councilman Doug Labor for the vacancy, while councilman Park Mayhew nominated Weatherby. Councilman Ted Forman nominated Kintner, to end all nominations for the seat.

Weatherby was sworn in by Mayor Dan Conant to fill the unexpired term of Sechrist, who began his four-year term in January.

Conant named Weatherby to the town's zoning board as council representative, taking Sechrist's place. He named councilman Gene Sparks to replace Sechrist on the finance committee, and Forman to take Sechrist's seat on the priorities committee.

Residents from two traffic trouble spots in the village were at council, all exclaiming the

same problems aired before council at previous meetings. Warren Owen returned seeking answers to Rainbow Ave. problems, and Handle Hughes and Mavis Lloyd handed in a petition signed by all residents but one with property along Walnut St. to look into speed problems along that street, between Laurel Ct. and S.R. 37.

Owen called council's attention to a similar petition he had presented to the board at its Apr. 7 meeting. That petition had been signed by Rainbow Ave. residents, seeking a 4-way stop at Rainbow and Old St., as a means of slowing traffic down.

Mayor Conant told Owen council had ruled out the 4-way stop back at the April meeting, and said Sunbury police had run radar on Rainbow and determined there was no real problem.

Owen replied he felt the police officer who ran the radar on only one occasion had done so "not at a good time," and added, "there is a speed problem up there, or people wouldn't have signed the petition."

Owen said he's given council a list of times it would be better to patrol the area, and councilman Forman told him to give such a list to the police.

Labor asked, "What would you have the police do if you were in our position?" to which Owen

replied, "Put on another cruiser. That's what I understand some candidates told people they'd do last fall."

Mayor Conant said he'd check with police to further study the speed problem on Rainbow, and get back to Owen and council at its next meeting, two weeks.

Owen then pointed out there is "a parking problem still on Rainbow." Forman said he specifically kept an eye on the parking there, and noted "I feel it is much better, at least a 50 percent improvement."

Owen replied, however, that "Trail has begun at the Big Walnut Intermediate School playground, and 'that makes it worse.' Warren asked, 'Is the property owner responsible for keeping parked cars off the sidewalks, or is the village?'"

Solicitor Keith Boger answered, "I wouldn't want to answer that without doing some research."

Owen also asked, "Who is responsible for repair to the sidewalks after these people park on them and tear them up?"

Solicitor Boger replied the cost of repairs is always on the property owner, "though if you can prove the damages you can sue the ones who have parked on them and torn them up."

"I'm not here to make anyone

Sheep Shearing Wraps Up New Zealand Trip

Editor's Note: Big Walnut graduate Jeff Miller recently returned from his 6-month stay in New Zealand as a participant in the International Post-17 Youth Exchange (IFYE) program. The following is the final column he wrote about his travels "down under." Jeff says he's available for slide presentations and talks about his exchange trip, and can be reached at 965-1796.

My final newsletter from New Zealand wouldn't be complete without another mention of sheep.

My exchange concludes at the International Shearing and Wool-handling Championships in Masterton. The "Golden Shears" was started in 1961 to promote the highest standards of shearing and woolhandling. The competition provides the chance for shearers from New Zealand and around the world to show off their skills.

The competition centers on the shearer's ability to remove the wool from the sheep as quickly as possible. The fastest of the shearers can consistently shave the wool off a full grown ewe in less than a minute. Lambs can be shorn even faster, taking around 30 seconds.

Efficiency is just as important as speed. If the shearer doesn't remove all of the wool in his initial pass, he is given a penalty point for each second cut. The other thing that will cost a shearer points is if he nick or cut the sheep's hide with their razor sharp blades.

Take all of these judging factors and put six shearers on a stage in a large auditorium, and you have the makings for an exciting competition. All of the shearers that compete at the Golden Shears are some of the best in the world.

They make an extremely difficult job look so easy. It takes a great deal of concentration and coordination to be able to control a full grown sheep, quickly remove the wool, and still not cut the skin.

The handpiece that the shearer uses becomes an extension of his hand. It looks as if the wool is just wiped right off the sheep with each passing blow that the shearer makes.

In a typical day of work a good shearer can do 300-400 ewes or 600 lambs. They get paid 75 cents per ewe and 65 cents per lamb. If you add that up over a year's time it adds up to a little income earned from shearing.

Shearing is tough, sweaty, back bending work. Anyone who can make their living from shearing is a highly skilled professional in my book. After having tried my hand at shearing, these people have truly earned my respect for their skills and abilities.

Bits From New Zealand
Every Sunday in New Zealand there are absolutely no commercials on radio or television. Just think what an afternoon of NFJ programming would be like with no commercials!

There are many ways to enjoy Kiwifruit, a fuzzy brown, egg shaped fruit. It can be cut in half and scooped out with a spoon, or peeled and sliced and

The Patersons own and operate a 27,000 acre Merino sheep station with over 6,000 ewes. Their blue eyes are characteristic, especially on the South Island, and you never see an over-weight farmer in New Zealand," Jeff notes.

Ken stays trim by walking over his ranch, the same hills he 65-year-old mother trains over as she keeps in shape. "She plays competitive field hockey and runs over those same hills to stay

mad." Owen said. "These are some of the legal technicalities about subdivide that need to be looked into. That's why I keep coming back."

Owen pointed out several tracks were issued (moral Day) when he called police about those parked on the sidewalk. "That's the first day they started (talking) and something had to be done."

Mayor Conant told Owen to continue to call police when persons park on the sidewalks. Hughes and Lloyd pointed out Walnut Street is not made for truck traffic and suggested the speed limit be reduced to 20 mph. "Clark when I first moved here," Hughes said, "that street was gravel, full of chuck holes and we didn't have the problem. Then the town paved it, and now we have problems."

Roger told Lloyd and Hughes that legally, 25 mph is the lowest limit allowed on village streets, "unless it is in a school zone."

Lacher pointed out, "If the problem is with trucks using the street, let's post 'No Truck Trucks' signs, at least."

Hughes responded people using Walnut as a short-cut from Laurel Ct. to 37 and "young kids" are the biggest offenders of speed limits on Walnut.

Lacher suggested council, "as a committee-of-the-whole or whatever," look into the two problem areas presented to council Wednesday. "We've had enough people here over the past months to really give them more than passing attention."

As far as reports to council, Forman said the street committee is going ahead with the only paving planned for this summer, in Sunbury Gardens.

And, Mayor Conant pointed out to E. S. Sloan & Associates engineering. Ronald Huprich and the Board of Public Affairs will be at the next council meeting, June 15, to seek an ordinance allowing the EPA to raise non-residential users' water rates 20-25¢ per gallon for the design phase for a new water treatment plant and reservoir for the village.

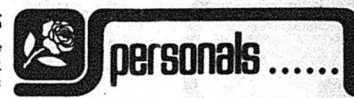

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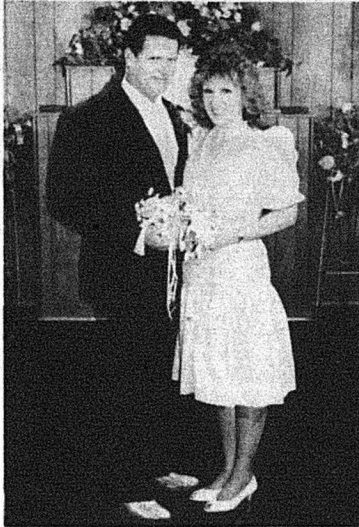

YOUR EYES

SUNGLASS SEASON

With summer practically here, people are starting to think about new sunglasses. Though people now realize the importance of wearing sunglasses for extended periods outdoors, many do not know whether the glasses they purchase can absorb ultraviolet rays.
