Phil Shultz of Sunbury caught a 24-inch walleye in Hoover Dam reservoir. The fish was the largest one reported this season.

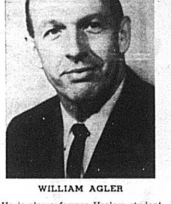

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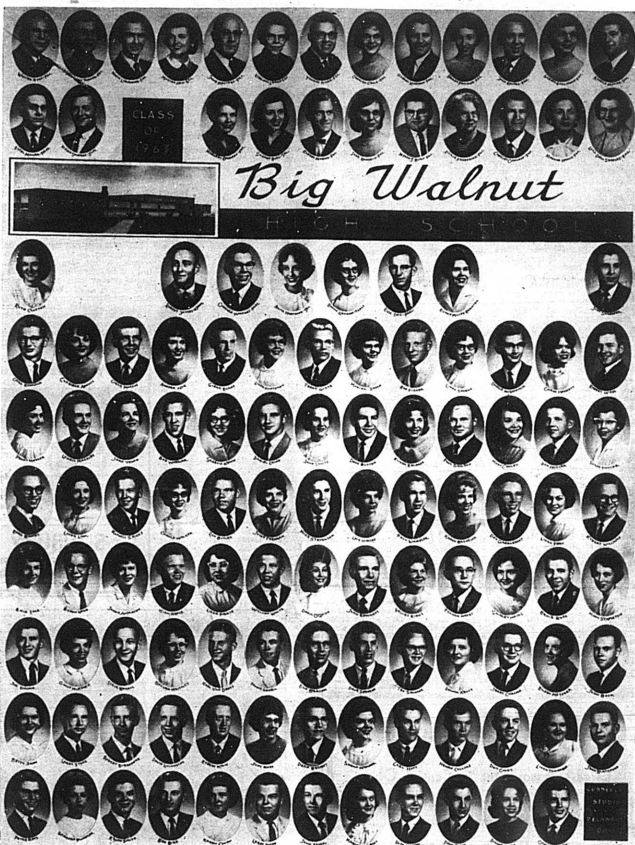
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## BIG WALNUT HUNT STUDENT TELLS ABOUT HIS WEEK AT NATIONAL SCIENCE FAIR

Editor's Note: Edmund Hay, Big Walnut School sophomore, was one of the two students winning first in the recent regional science fair at Otterbein College that gave him a free trip to the National Science Fair in Albuquerque, N. M. He made a most excellent report on the project. He tells you about the fair in the following:

First, I must describe the airplane ride. It was quite impressive to look down over clouds at the towns and farms below. At the airport, we were greeted by a line of jetliners. We passed over the Mississippi River which looked like a blue ribbon from the air, but I know it was the Mississippi made it great. Finally, we passed over mountains, near Albuquerque, on which you could see snow at these streaks of white and trees as small green dots. We landed at Albuquerque Airport but excited.

The people of Albuquerque gave us a warm welcome. They were ready to assist and advise us. We were taken to a room where we were welcomed with signs reading: "Welcome, National Science Fair Visitors." Committees were set up to efficiently handle every facet of the science fair and much information was given by computers.

**Nobel Prize Winner Open Fair.**  
Dr. Glenn Seaborg, Nobel prize winner in chemistry, gave us a speech and a very impressive opening ceremony. The opening ceremonies included playing the national anthem, prayer, introduction of important dignitaries, music, a science-fair skit and Mr. Seaborg's speech. I met Dr. Seaborg and he gave me his autograph.

We attended a science talk, a lecture and two awards dinners. Many tours and seminars were available for the exhibitors. I took the tour to Los Alamos National Laboratory. The Sandia Mountains were beautiful, and you could look down from them and see the entire city of Albuquerque, the Rio Grande River, the surrounding desert. On the tour to Los Alamos Laboratories to see their cyclotron and Vanier facilities for nuclear research, their electronics laboratories and their health research laboratories.

Many people have asked about judging so I will briefly describe this. Awards were given by special associations (i. e., the American Medical Association, the U. S. Army, the National Geographic Commission and the National Science Fair-International. The special societies gave awards for projects in their fields. The NSF gave awards for projects judged best at the fair. There were 41 projects present, 189 won awards of some type. In my opinion, all the projects at the fair were outstanding. Every project seemed to entail a large amount of research and knowledge. I was able to meet many of the

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exhibitors and we talked about everything from subscribing our projects to telling the latest jokes. Everyone was friendly and all seemed to have an excellent knowledge of science. In my opinion, one of the most rewarding parts of the trip was meeting the exhibitors.

This fair was an experience not to be soon forgotten. "Ah, but my reach should exceed his grasp or what's a heaven for?" — Robert Frost (modified).
